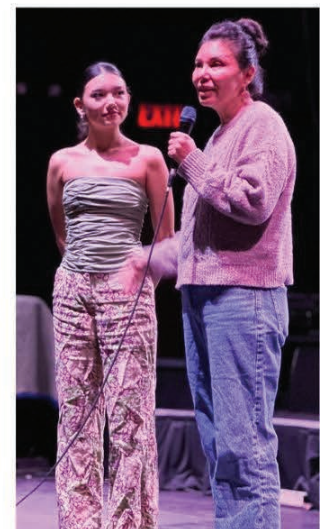

YEAR IN REVIEW

MCA AND CBSA ANNOUNCED PERMANENT DOMESTIC LANE AT CORNWALL POE TO IMPROVE TRAVELLER EXPERIENCE

In January 2024, the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne (MCA) and the Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) announced that the Domestic Lane at the Cornwall port of entry has been made permanent following a successful two-year pilot project.

Recognizing the particular geography of the Cornwall port of entry, the Pilot Project was launched in late 2020, which designated a lane specifically for domestic travel. Since its launch, travellers have benefitted from a smoother border crossing experience at the CBSA Cornwall port of entry, including shorter wait times and reduced congestion.

The now permanent Domestic Lane is accessible to travellers who have not entered the United States. It includes those who are travelling directly to and from Kawehno:ke (Cornwall Island). Domestic travel include Akwesasne residents and non-residents and signage at the port of entry clearly indicates which lane is for domestic travel only.

The Domestic Lane was developed as part of the Border Collaboration Initiative, a joint effort by the CBSA and MCA to improve the daily lives of all who travel through the Cornwall port of entry. The CBSA is committed to working in collaboration with Indigenous partners in providing integrated border services that both support national security and public safety priorities and facilitate the free flow of admissible people and goods. As part of its commitment to Reconciliation, the CBSA has been working with Indigenous Peoples and communities on border mobility to build a relationship based on respect, partnership, and recognition of Indigenous rights.

“The Domestic Lane demonstrates what’s possible when we listen to one another and work together,” said CBSA President Erin O’Gorman. “By reducing wait times and speeding up processing, the Domestic Lane has improved the experience at the Cornwall port of entry for Akwesasne residents who need to cross regularly for school, work, shopping and healthcare. We’re committed to ongoing dialogue and collaboration with the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne as we continue to build a path to support this community.”

“The Domestic Lane is an example of improvements that have been made, and will ideally continue to be made, to improve the border crossing experience for residents of Akwesasne,” said former MCA Grand Chief Abram Benedict. “We continue to work with the CBSA to ensure the concerns of our community members are heard. Through our partnership, we will continue to find modern solutions to address the historic complications created by the drawing of the international border.”

The elders were on a roll at Lucky Strike Lanes as they enjoyed some friendly competition, laughs, good food and tons of fun!

TETEWATA'THERÍ:KE — WE ARE FILLING OUR BASKET

In January 2024, the Tetewata'therí:ke ("We are filling our basket") concluded their five-week programming with the support of the Akwesasne Child and Family Services (ACFS) Traditional Support Unit. The circle included ten female youth between the ages of 13-17 where they met twice a week over the course of a five-week period working together to expand their cultural knowledge, learn teachings, make new friends and create lasting memories.

The concept of Tetewata'therí:ke was based on filling our "life" basket with positive, healthy, productive and culturally sound life-skills. Although some of the things we carry in our basket are positive, there are times that what we carry in our baskets is not pleasant. Sometimes, we have individuals or families that need to "unpack" their baskets first. They need help to remove those traumas, heartaches and unhealthy coping skills.

Each young lady began by crafting a utility basket under the guidance of Basket Maker, Glenn Swamp. Glenn shared with the weavers that "the first splint represents you, then as you weave around yourself, you have your parents, your grandparents, your community...everything begins with you in the center."

Participants also utilized journals for self-reflection, sewed their own ribbon skirts and created vision boards and goal setting. Apryl Thompson led a modern hoop style beaded earring class. Chazy Cook taught the young women different hair braiding styles and Colleen Nolan facilitated a moc-

asin making workshop. This group of young women took the initiative to begin a lifetime journey of learning, adding to their medicine bundles, learning about themselves, their culture, and the importance of their presence in the world.

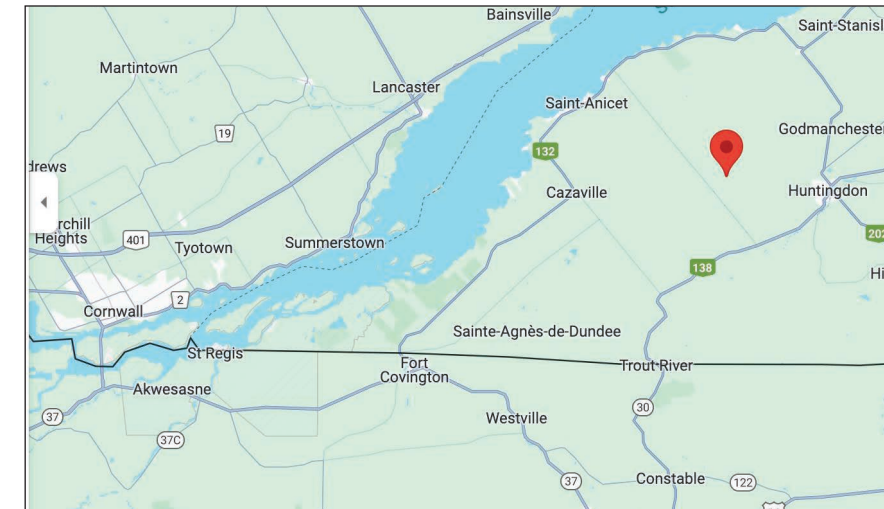

MCA's management and Council nominated Mr. David for the AWWAO's Paul Strohack Operator of the Year Award, and he received the honor at the annual Aboriginal Water and Wastewater Association of Ontario conference held in Sault Saint Marie.

The new medical transport van accommodates up to four wheelchairs and also has a new hydraulic lift for easier wheelchair accessibility. The new van also has upgrades for a smoother and quieter ride for the drivers and clients.

AMA EMT STAFF EARNED LIFE SAVE AWARD

In May 2024, the Akwesasne Mohawk Ambulance (AMA) proudly recognized Paramedic Ryan Jacobs, Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) Serena Sunday, and Critical Care EMT Melanie Jacobs for their exceptional work. Their heroic efforts and lifesaving intervention earned them the AMA Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) Life Save Award.

On October 28, 2023, Ryan Jacobs and Serena Sunday responded to a cardiac arrest call where CPR was already in progress. They took immediate action, soon joined by Critical Care Technician Melanie Jacobs. Through their combined expertise and dedication, they successfully revived the patient, who was then safely transported to the hospital. After several days of recovery, the patient was discharged home.

This award recognizes a successful Return of Spontaneous Circulation (ROSC), sustained ROSC, safe hospital transport, transfer of care, and the patient's continuation of life after discharge. CPR saves like this are rare, highlighting the critical impact and im-

portance of the lifesaving skills practiced by EMS providers.

This success story is a testament to the team's hard work, resilience, and unwavering dedication to preserving life. Join us in celebrating their remarkable achievement and their commitment to our community's health and safety.

MAKING A SPLASH IN WATER ADVOCACY

In May 2024, Tekaherha Logan Lazore, Environment Field Technician for the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne Environment Program, embarked on an exciting, albeit lengthy journey to Bali, Indonesia. For Logan, this was not merely a leisurely trip; it was an eye opening and inspiring experience, which delved into her identify as to who she is as an Onkwehonwe, as well as her life-long mission to protect our sacred waters.

As a Youth Delegate representing Akwesasne and Canada, Logan attended the 6th General Assembly World Youth Summit and the 10th World Water Forum. These platforms weren't merely spaces to talk; they were arenas for diverse voices to come together to envision a healthier and happier future for our waters. Despite limited Indigenous representation, Logan stood proud as an Akwesasronon. Attendees representing small and large communities gathered to share not only their challenges, but also to propose solutions. Regardless of where the individuals came from, everyone present had a common purpose: to enhance the well-being of our waters.

Logan's days in Bali were filled with a whirlwind of activities, each leaving a lasting impression. While some moments were inspiring and once-in-a-lifetime opportunities, such as releasing young and adult turtles back into the sea, others were less glamorous. Logan noted how heartbroken she was when she participated in a mangrove cleanup, where every inch of the site was covered in garbage. Regardless if the moments were positive or negative, every encounter reinforced her commitment to her cause.

Throughout the summit and forum, Logan delivered numerous presentations and also engaged in various panel discussions. She spoke of the erosion on Yellow Island, of chemical pollution in the St. Lawrence, and the delicate balance between tradition and modernity. She began each session with an introduction

in Kanienkeha and the Ohen:ten Kariwaterhkwen. Logan didn't just articulate her thoughts and ideas, she sang them too. The crowd was treated to her beautiful and melodic rendition of the water song in Kanienkeha. Along with work requirements, Logan also found moments of serenity. As a self-described "fish girl", she found snorkelling mesmerizing. It served as a reminder of the interconnectedness of all life forms, emphasizing that humans are not the center of the universe. This is a message that she also frequently conveyed in her speeches.

Throughout the entire journey, Logan remained connected to Akwesasne. She wrapped herself in her mother's beautiful ribbon skirts, held her father's basket, grasped her brother's rattle, and was decorated by her sister's earrings – a reminder of who she is and the community she represents. And through it all, she emphasized one simple truth: water is sacred, water is beautiful, water is life.

GREEN FOOD BAG INITIATIVE REVITALIZED BY HEALTH PROMOTION & PREVENTION PROGRAM

In June 2024, the MCA Department of Health's (DOH) Health Promotion & Prevention, a program under the Community Health Services Sector, revitalized the Green Food Bag initiative, with staff distributing fruits and vegetables at the Kanonhkwa'tsheri:io Health Facility.

The Green Food Bag initiative offers community members fresh produce for a low cost on a monthly basis. The bags will contain various fruits and vegetables, and at least two seasonal items (depending on availability). Each bag will cost \$20, with bags limited to two (2) per person. Supplies/orders are limited.

When submitting an e-transfer payment for your Green Food Bag order, please ensure to note "Green Food Bag," the month being paid, name and phone number in the message portion of the e-transfer payment. Failure to do so can result in your order and payment not being adequately processed.

Their presence and speeches added a special touch to the evening.

The celebration featured a traditional meal, heartfelt speeches, and meaningful gifts. Grand Chief Benedict was presented with a symbolic blanket from the current council. The blanket's colors transitioned from purple and white, representing the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne, to red, symbolizing the Chiefs of Ontario and his new role. Throughout the evening, council members and guests shared inspiring words, funny stories and reflected on his contributions and leadership.

A notable highlight was the surprise celebration for the late Kana:takon District Chief Tim "Dooley" Thompson, who played a key role in organizing the event. Council honored him with a quilt and kind words in recognition of his retirement. Thompson, who previously served as MCA Grand Chief and held numerous terms as Kana:takon District chief, was visibly moved by the heartfelt tributes. Chief Thompson, along with his signature hat, will be fondly missed by the Council.

MCA WELCOMED NEW 2024-2027 COUNCIL OATHS OF OFFICE ADMINISTERED

In October 2024, the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne officially sworn-in the newly elected Council for the 2024-2027 term at the Tsi Snaihne Recreation with Justice Alexandra David administering the oaths of office.

MCA is governed by a community-elected 13-Chief Council consisting of one Grand Chief and 12 District Chiefs (four per district). All 13 seats are elected to 3-year terms. The MCA General By-Election was held on September 14, 2024 following successful Appeals to the original June 29, 2024 General Election.

The new Council was welcomed into office by outgoing Acting Grand Chief Cindy Francis-Mitchell and MCA Executive Director Mose Herne, as well as many well-wishing community members.

"This moment is not just a transition of leadership; it is a re-affirmation of our commitment to the values that define us as a community – respect, resilience and renewal," said Executive Director Herne. "To our newly elected Council members, you stand before us as a reflection of our collective hopes and aspirations. Your election is not just a personal achievement; it is an expression of trust and confidence from the people of Akwesasne to advance their interests with commitment, integrity, and vision."

The 2024-2027 Council is a mix of new and returning District Chiefs, as well as the first new Grand Chief in nine years. Grand Chief Leonard Lazore provided words of vision to the community in his first speech.

"Today marks the start of a new day, a new way. Akwesasne has achieved so much, and it's time to take that to the next level," Grand Chief Lazore said. "To the new Council, I commend you all for stepping up. The challenges will be great, and the challenges will be many. To the community, I want to thank you for your faith. Not only in me, but in this whole team. I think we are going to do great things together."

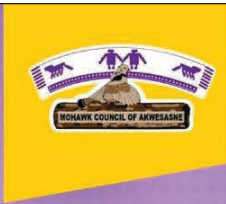

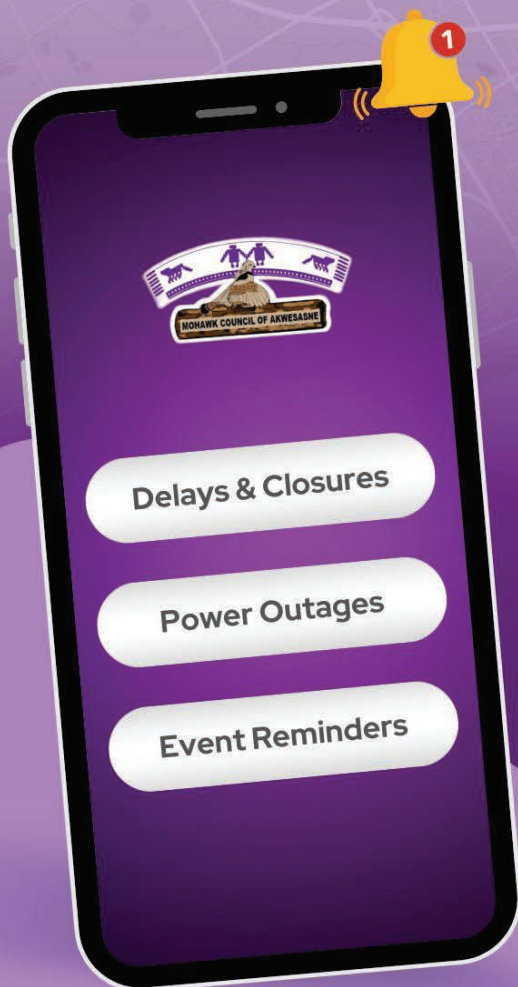
