Sometimes, we have individuals or families that need to "unpack" their baskets first. They need help to remove those traumas, heartaches and unhealthy coping skills.

Each young lady began by crafting a utility basket under the guidance of Basket Maker, Glenn Swamp. Glenn shared with the weavers that "the first splint represents you, then as you weave around yourself, you have your parents, your grandparents, your community...everything begins with you in the center."

Participants also utilized journals for self- reflection, sewed their own ribbon skirts and created vision boards and goal setting. Apryl Thompson led a modern hoop style beaded earring class. Chazy Cook taught the young women different hair braiding styles and Colleen Nolan facilitated a moc-







On October 28, 2023, Ryan Jacobs and Serena Sunday responded to a cardiac arrest call where CPR was already in progress. They took immediate action, soon joined by Critical Care Technician Melanie Jacobs. Through their combined expertise and dedication, they successfully revived the patient, who was then safely transported to the hospital. After several days of recovery, the patient was discharged home.

This award recognizes a successful Return of Spontaneous Circulation (ROSC), sustained ROSC, safe hospital transport, transfer of care, and the patient's continuation of life after discharge. CPR saves like this are rare, highlighting the critical impact and im-






