ORANGE SHIRT COMMITTEE PRESENTS CHEQUE TO AKWESASNE FREEDOM SCHOOL

In honour of Orange Shirt Day and the recognition of language revitalization efforts, the Orange Shirt Committee proudly presented a cheque for \$10,385.44 to the Akwesasne Freedom School on October 25, 2023.

The committee was proud to support the non-profit Akwesasne Freedom School as they are working to build a new school for their full immersion programming. Operating since 1979, the school is committed to increasing Mohawk fluency, all through private funding and donations.

The funds were raised through orange shirt sales made for the committee's Orange Shirt Day event at Lamoureux Park. This year's Orange Shirt Day committee was a collaboration of the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne, City of Cornwall council and staff, the Children's Aid Society and the Native North American Travelling College. The committee organized an informative and meaningful event on September 30th that was attended by hundreds of Cornwall, Akwesasne and surrounding area community members. The event featured powerful presentations by Indigenous residential school survivors and community members along with a showcase of arts, food and Indigenous culture.

REFERENDUM CALLED FOR FINAL DRAFT OF AKWESASNE ELECTION LAW AMENDMENTS

The Chief Referendum Officer (Chief Electoral Officer) Leona Benedict hereby gives notice of an upcoming referendum on the final draft of the Akwesasne Election Law Amendments.

The Akwesasne Election Law Amendments will only be passed with the approval of the community by referendum.

Polling stations will be set up on Saturday, December 9, 2023 from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. at the following locations:

- District of Kawehno:ke – Ahkwesahsne Mohawk School (AMS)
- District of Tsi Snaihne – Tsi Snaihne School
- District of Kana:takon – Kana:takon School

If you are a Member of the Mohawks of Akwesasne, as per the Akwesasne Membership Code, and your name is on the Referendum Voters List, you will be eligible to vote.

CALL OUT FOR TRUST OVERSEERS

CANDIDATES MUST DEMONSTRATE:

- Knowledge of the Kanienkehaka culture and the Akwesasne community.
- A commitment to learning, or enriching his/her knowledge of, the Kanienkeha language.
- Knowledge, understanding and commitment to the role of Trust Overseer.
- Honesty, integrity, ethical conduct and common sense.
- The ability to maintain objectivity, fairness, accountability and operational transparency.
- Knowledge of issues and needs within the community of Akwesasne.

CRITERIA FOR OVERSEERS:

- Be at least eighteen (18) years of age.
- Have been a resident in the Mohawk Territory of Akwesasne for at least ten (10) years and within the last fifteen (15) years.

- Have demonstrable knowledge and life experience of the Mohawks of Akwesasne.
- Be willing to put the collective, best interest of the Mohawks of Akwesasne before personal interest.
- No be an elected official of either MCA or SRMT.
- Not be a member of the Technical Working Committee of the Akwesasne Community Trust.
- Never have been convicted of an offense under Akwesasne Law, an indictable offense in Canada or a felony in the United States.
- Not have been convicted of an offense under Akwesasne Law, a summary conviction in Canada or a misdemeanor in the U.S. in the past five (5) years.

COUNCIL WEEKLY MEETING REPORT

SUBMITTED BY GRAND CHIEF ABRAM BENEDICT



October 3, 2023

- Legal Counsel presented to Council the dispute resolution options for Block One lands. Research will be done on possible external experts to

review documentation.

- Legal Counsel provided Council with an overview of proposed amendments to the Akwesasne Membership Board Election Regulations, the Elders Council Charter and Procedural Regulations. The amendments will be presented to Council for acceptance in the coming weeks.
- Council agreed that no Council meeting will occur next week due to holiday.
- A concern with misinformation on social media was discussed.
- Council debriefed from the General Meeting and received an update

from administration on follow up.

- A request/reminder was made for the sharing of action items from District Meeting with other district members.
- **MCRs passed:** Approval of update to 21/24 Council Portfolio & Committee Listing; Acceptance of Indigenous Institute Safety Grant; Approval of name change to the Aboriginal Rights and Research Office; Approval to allocate surplus for furniture purchase Tsiionkwanonhso:te; Approval of service contract for Doctor; Approval of 10 Council Meeting Minutes.

October 16, 2023

- A request for assistance from Community Support regarding a client's right-of-way issue was discussed and will be further researched.
- A briefing was provided on a recent site visit of property for sale owned by Ontario.
- A request to have District Meeting dates scheduled ahead of the holiday season was discussed and will be actioned on.
- Council agreed that due to scheduling and availability the General Meeting will be held on November 2, 2023.
- A briefing was provided on the Executive Committee's efforts to recruit

an Executive Director for the MCA.

- Council discussed the creation of a bully and harassment statement for public meetings and the need to update the MCA Respect in the Workplace policy. A draft will be circulated.
- An update was provided on follow-up for a departmental concern that was received.
- Council agreed that Community Holiday Dinners will be scheduled for December.
- **MCRs passed:** Approval of (6) Upgrade Loans to Community Member(s); Approval of new permit for Bell Canada; Approval to rescind previous MCR for lease on Ross Is-

land; Approval of new construction loan to community member; Approval of BMO mortgage guarantee for community member; Approval of 2023 December holiday closure for the MCA; Approval of Building Safer Communities Fund Contribution Agreement; Acceptance of (3) Notice of Budget Amendment to Akwesasne Canada Funding Agreement; Acceptance of Service Contract for Healer/Traditional Medicines; Approval of amendment to Akwesasne Canada funding agreement; Approval of final draft of Akwesasne Election Law to be considered by referendum. MCRs denied: Approval to rescind previous MCR on Akwesasne Election Law proposed amendments.

October 23, 2023

- Council reviewed a sponsorship re-

quest from the Kawehno:ke Recreation Committee regarding the up-

coming Christmas holiday. Council agreed to sponsor all three recre-

ation centres.

- A briefing was provided on an upcoming training session on Lateral Kindness scheduled for November 8 & 9, 2023.
- Council received a briefing on possible training for community and staff on Jordan's Principle. Administration will follow up.
- A briefing was provided on a recent call with Indigenous Services Canada regarding a possible feasibility study for a multi-use Emergency Evacuation Center. Further research will be conducted.
- Council requested an update on any plans to review the MCA salary grid.
- A briefing was provided on behalf of the MCA Executive Committee on the status of the recruitment for an Executive Director for the MCA. The committee will move forward with another posting utilizing an executive search firm.
- A community concern was discussed

regarding the road rumble strips in Kana:takon. The rumble strips will remain in place and their effectiveness will be reviewed in the spring.

- Council discussed the upcoming General Meeting set for November 2 and agreed that a new format will be considered for future meetings.
- A request to have the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) be present to share information at future Machine Readable Zone (MRZ) Secure Status Card intakes was discussed. Council determined that an information session with CRA should be scheduled, but separate from the Secure Status Card sessions.
- Information was shared about a recent worksite accident on the U.S. bridge. A follow-up letter will be sent to ensure all communication and emergency protocols are in place and reviewed, for implementation during any potential future accidents.
- A briefing was provided on a complaint received regarding a right of

entry refusal at the Cornwall Port of Entry for using a Saint Regis Mohawk Tribal card. Further information will be sought and a follow-up discussion will occur with CBSA.

- A request to convert a seasonal lease to a year-round lease on Hamilton Island was discussed. Council determined no new year-round leases will be allowed.
- **MCRs passed:** Approval for additional allocation to Elders Emergency Fund; Approval of assignment of lease Francis Island; Approval of allotment of land St. Regis Village (loan paid off); Approval of survey on Western Islands; Approval to increase BMO mortgage guarantee amount to \$225,000; Approval to increase MCA new construction loan amounts to \$225,000; Approval of application for funding and reserve allocation for design of Hawthorne Road; Approval of amendment to Akwesasne/Canada funding agreement; Approval of 2022/23 CMHC Audit Statements.

October 31, 2023

- Council received a briefing on a mortgage default request against a property and agreed that follow-up would be done to resolve the matter.
- A request for a letter of support for an agricultural grant was received and agreed to by Council.
- Council discussed and agreed to provide additional support for the upcoming district recreation holiday events.
- A request for clarification on MCA doctor availability after December 1, 2023, was made and will be followed up on by administration.
- Council discussed the overpopula-

tion of cats. Follow-up will be done with the local animal society to discuss partnership options.

- A request for assistance with special needs was discussed. Council members will meet to advance the conversation.
- Council discussed the MCA Halloween early closure and referred a request to close all offices early to the Executive Director.
- A briefing was provided on a historical land use agreement.
- **MCRs passed:** Approval of contribution agreement with Environment Canada; Approval of five years of

allocation of resources to connect homes to waterline; Approval of referendum date for Akwesasne Election Law amendments; Approval of MCA strategic plan implementation proposal; Approval of purchase of CISCO WebEx phone system; Approval of 22/23 audit report for Ministry of Long-Term Care; Approval of 22/23 Mohawk Police Service Audit; Approval of 22/23 AMPS SAVE Team Audit; Approval of AMPS JIT Audit.

PORTFOLIO UPDATES:

Department of Health – Quebec Health Meeting - In August we met with Monteregie Regional Health representatives and had discussions regarding issues within Akwesasne which included issues with licensing/funding/language, partnerships, patient navigators (English), and priorities. We had a robust discussion on each of these issues and proposed solutions on how we can fix them to better serve Akwesasronon. We have since

followed up and have applied for several PREMs to have additional doctors and nurses available to work in Akwesasne.

Queen's University Partnership

– Discussions with Queen's University continue on how we can better serve the community with our partnership. The two most important discussions were how to get more Akwesasronon interested in the medical field and apply to Queen's University for their Medical Program. The second discussion was how to get more students to do their residency in Akwesasne and come back to the community after completing their program. During our conversations, we also discussed the concerns of cancer within Akwesasne and Kingston Cancer Care Center (KCCC) was brought up in discussion. We decided to engage with KCCC to see if they can accept Quebec Health Insurance so all members of the Akwesasne community can be served.

Lateral Kindness Initiative – In May of 2022, I met Indigenise LLC. owner Don Lyons (Anishinabe/Mohawk) at Reservation Economic Summit 2022. Don specializes in wellness, economic development

and how they tie together within Indian Country. He says, "It is hard to run a successful system with broken parts." I resonated with this statement and invited Don to visit Akwesasne. During his visit in July 2022, he met and partnered with MCA Department of Health and SRMT Education Division to work on a plan for MCA/SRMT/Akwesasne to work on lateral kindness between the organizations and within the community. In December 2022, he worked with the Directors of MCA and SRMT and most recently MCA Chiefs in November 2023. We are working towards having Don back in February 2024.

Mental Health/Health Roundtable

– In May 2023, we started a Mental Health/Health roundtable and included all the programs within the MCA, SRMT, and the independent individuals working within the community. We had numerous meetings and are beginning to work with departments between all organizations. We are starting to develop shared goals and conversations to be more efficient within the community. We are also working on mapping programs with the MCA and SRMT.

COMMITTEE UPDATES:

Akwesasne Green Team – We are currently working on the Terms of reference for the Akwesasne Green Team to ensure the committee can be more effective.

Youth, Elders, Language, Culture

– We have been working on applying for grant funding with Heritage Canada to fund language programs within Akwesasne.

MEETINGS ATTENDED:

I had invited the First Nations and Inuit Health Branch of Indigenous Services Canada (FNIHB) to visit Akwesasne for a tour of the community. From that meeting with FNIHB, we secured \$3 million dollars in funding to be utilized for Health, Mental Health, and Land-Based Healing.

I also invited Associate Minister of Mental Health & Addictions Michael Tibollo visit Akwesasne this past August. The visit was specific to continuing to build a relationship between the Ontario Government and Akwesasne regarding Mental Health & Addictions. We then received funding support from Associate Minister Tibollo for

Sahatihaharà:ne Detox Center and a new bus for Tsionkwanonhso:te Long-Term Care. There was an agreement with Associate Minister Tibollo to search for funding for the following initiatives we must submit for: Alternate Health Wellness, Additional Funding for Patient Navigators.

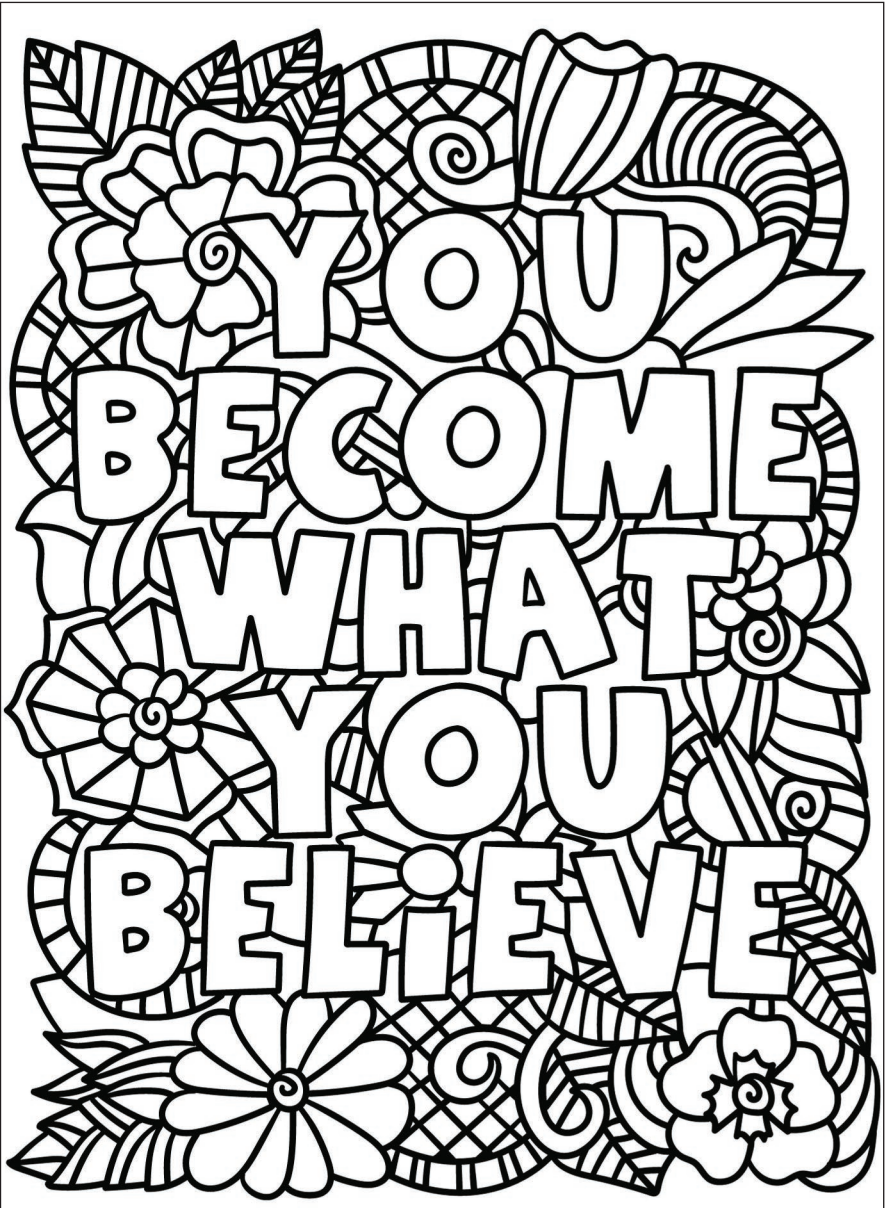

THE MOHAWK COUNCIL OF AKWESASNE RETAINS THE SERVICES OF LEGAL COUNSEL

As of October 25, 2023, Legal Counsel is available at the Akwesasne Justice Department for a set number of hours per week. The Akwesasne Justice Department schedules appointments for community members on Wednesday mornings from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. to meet with Legal Counsel.

Pending availability, Legal Counsel will provide limited services for community members:

- Initial consultation on personal legal issues – summary advice
- Wills
- Power of Attorney
- Commissioner of Oaths
- Notary Public - Notarized copies of original documents
- Referral to other services
- Drafting of Agreements between two individuals, provided there is agreements between the two parties.

There is a \$25 fee for Wills and for a Power of Attorney.

The following is a list of what is not handled by MCA Legal Counsel:

- Individual criminal matters of community members.
- Disputes between community members or with community organizations.
- Divorce or separation matters.
- Matters of a financial nature involving private business or private organizations.

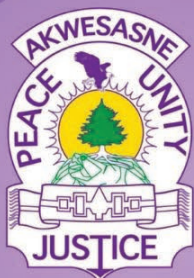

SUMMARY OF RESPONSIBILITIES:

The appointed individual must abide by and uphold all provisions of the Akwesasne Election Law MCR 2019/2020 #212 and any successor law; and the General Referendum Regulations.

The duties that the DEO will be required to perform are as follows:

- Must attend all scheduled training sessions;
- Abide by the Oath of Office;
- Must be available on Election Day or for Referendums;
- Assist with E-voting when implemented;
- Assist the CEO in the preparation of updating Voters' List;
- Assist the CEO with clerical duties;
- Assist the CEO with the preparation of reports for submission to the Executive Director;
- Provide information and answer questions asked by community members during the Process of a General Election, By-Election or Referendum;
- Conduct the General Election or By-Election pursuant to the Akwesasne Election Law;
- Conduct the referendum in accordance with the General Referendum Regulations;
- Assist with the setup and breakdown of the polling stations as well as ensuring equipment and election material are returned to the designated office by the CEO;
- Must pass a criminal reference check (CPIC);
- Must be available to testify in an election hearing, if necessary;

- Must take direction from the CEO and perform duties required to conduct an election or Referendum.

QUALIFICATIONS:

The interested individual must:

- Be 21 years of age;
- Be an eligible Voter as defined pursuant to the Akwesasne Election Law;
- Have good character and reliable to work flexible hours;
- Must always conduct themselves in an ethical manner;
- Be in good standing in accordance with the MCA's Good Standing Policy;
- Be impartial and courteous to all electors;
- Pass a criminal reference check.

Previous experience as a CEO or DEO is considered an asset.

The ability to speak and understand the Mohawk Language is an asset.

The interested individual must abide by MCA's Respect in the Workplace Policy, Social Media Policy and must consent to a criminal reference check (CPIC).

Pursuant to the Akwesasne Election Law section 4.3 "No sitting member of Mohawk Council, Justice of the Peace, or Justices of the Akwesasne Mohawk Court shall be eligible to be an Electoral Officer."

Interested individuals can submit a letter of interest to the Executive Director located in the Administrative Building #1 in Kana:takon (St. Regis) Quebec. Letters of interest will be received until the position is filled.

If selected, the person must submit a valid CPIC, at their own expense, to the Executive Director within seven days before an appointment is made. Failure to submit a CPIC will disqualify the person.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH LAND-BASED HEALING PROGRAM WELCOMES WIIKWEMKOONG COMMUNITY TO AKWESASNE

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne's Land-Based Healing Program (LBH) welcomed members of the Wiikwemkoong nation to Akwesasne. The purpose of the visit was to create a partnership and share ideas and resources that would benefit both communities. The Wiikwemkoong nation members who attended the visit serve various roles in their home territory, such as mental health services, education, land-based practices, and youth and community services.

The Wiikwemkoong 9 Unceded Territory is a First Nation steeped in the Indigenous culture and language of the Anishinabek. Their territory is centered on Odawa Mnis and the surrounding islands in Lake Huron.

Over the course of the 2-day visit, which took place on October 19th and 20th, LBH staff welcomed their guests with an opening ceremony and provided an overview on the Land-Based Healing program, a presentation on the importance of self-care, a teaching on the significance of wampum by Allen Smoke, received a tour of the Sahatiharára:ne Detox Center, as well as sharing our cultural practices and community resources. Guests were also honored with songs from local singer and artist Bear Fox, as well as going through a small condolence ceremony with cultural educator Aronhiaies Herne.

LBH staff and the Wiikwemkoong members held discussions on what shared services and collaborations can take place in the very near future. "We look forward to collaborating with the Wiikwemkoong nation," said Brandon David, Program Manager for Land-Based Healing. "Many of the issues we face here in Akwesasne are similar to what they are facing. We want to share our ideas and resources to assist in any way that we can, because, as Indigenous people, I feel it is vital we continue to build relations with other First Nations, and assist our sister territories where we can."

WHAT TO DO IF YOU CONTRACT COVID-19

November 2, 2023 – The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne's Department of Health is providing the community with information on what to do if they contract COVID-19. With respiratory illness and flu season looming, it is highly recommended that Akwesasnonon follow public health guidelines and avoid the spread of flus, viruses, and illnesses to other community members.

Symptoms of COVID-19 include, but are not limited to:

- Fever/chills
- Cough
- Shortness of breath
- Decrease or loss of taste or smell
- Muscle aches or joint pain
- Extreme tiredness
- Runny or stuffy/congested nose
- Sore throat
- Headache
- Nausea/vomiting and/or diarrhea
- Abdominal pain
- Pink eye
- Decreased or no appetite (young children only)

If you have any COVID-19 symptoms (even if mild), it is recommended that you stay home (self-isolate) while you are sick.

This means:

- Staying home until you have no fever, and your symptoms are improving for at least 24 hours (or 48 hours if you have gastrointestinal symptoms such as vomiting and/or diarrhea).
- After isolating, wear a well-fitted, high-quality mask when out in public for 10 days from when your symptoms started.
- Avoid non-essential visits to vulnerable individuals (e.g., seniors) and highest risk settings (e.g., hospitals, long-term care) for 10 days from when your symptoms started.
- Follow this advice whether you have tested for COVID-19 or not.
- Make sure you know if you are eligible for COVID-19 treatments and how to get tested and access treatment if you are eligible.

To find out how long you need to self-isolate, complete the COVID-19 Self-Assessment (www.ontario.ca/self-assessment). Follow Public Health Ontario's instructions on how to self-isolate (scan QR code to view information.)

If you tested positive for COVID-19, but do not have any symptoms, you are not required to self-isolate. You should self-monitor for symptoms and self-isolate if symptoms develop.

op. Wear a well-fitted, high-quality mask when in public settings, especially if they are crowded or have poor ventilation, and avoid non-essential visits to vulnerable individuals (e.g., seniors) and high-risk settings for 10 days from your positive test date.

To stop the spread of COVID-19, it is important that you notify your close contacts, so that they can self-monitor for symptoms and self-isolate (stay home) if symptoms develop. A close contact is anyone who you spent time with when you were infectious.

If you have COVID-19 symptoms, your infectious period began 48 hours before your symptoms started.

If you do not have COVID-19 symptoms, your infectious period began 48 hours before your positive COVID-19 test date.

Close contacts include:

- Anyone you live with.
- Anyone who was within 2 meters (6 feet) of you for 15 minutes or more, without a well-fitted, high-quality mask.
- Anyone you had multiple close encounters with over a 24-hour period (even if each was less than 15 minutes) without a well-fitted, high-quality mask.
- Anyone you had close, physical contact with (e.g., hugging) without a well-fitted, high-quality mask.

Close contacts do not include:

- People you had brief, close contact with while wearing a well-fitted, high-quality mask and/or with a barrier (e.g., Plexiglas) in place.
- People who you passed by you quickly
- People you greeted while staying 2 meters (6 feet) apart.
- Someone who made a delivery to you while you were self-isolating, but who did not have close contact with you.

Individuals with a weak immune system should isolate for at least 10 days (from symptom onset or positive test date) regardless if you have symptoms of COVID-19.

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne would like to inform the community that the Akwesasne Heating Assistance Program (AHAP) has begun accepting applications. The final application deadline will be Friday, December 15, 2023 at 4 p.m. There will be no exceptions after the deadline date, as the fuel distribution will commence.

The application process is open to Akwesasronon who reside under the jurisdiction of Mohawk Council of Akwesasne in any one of the three northern districts, or within the City of Cornwall boundary, one per household.

All individuals MUST reapply, submit a new application, and provide a copy of your most recent heating bill for the heating source that you would like

paid. There will be no exceptions and the bill must accompany your application. Please ensure the name on your bill matches the name on the application or we will be unable to process it.

Individual checks will not be processed once approved as your name will be provided to your heating source provider and your allotment will be credited to your account. The payments to supplier vendors will not go out until after the closing date of the heating application process, which is December 15, 2023. Please ensure you keep making payments to your heating vendors before the closing date as there are no advanced payments allowed before the closing date. Applications will be accepted until 4 p.m. on Friday, December 15, 2023.

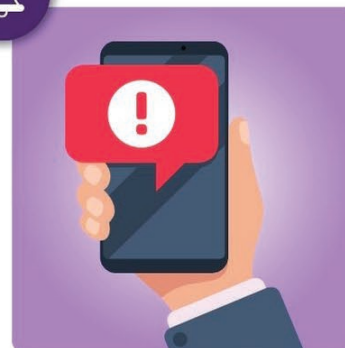
