Symptoms of COVID-19 include, but are not limited to:

- Fever/chills
- Cough • Shortness of breath

Extreme tiredness

Runny or stuffy/

congested nose

- Headache
- Nausea/vomiting and/or • Decrease or loss of taste diarrhea
  - Abdominal pain
- Muscle aches or joint pain
  Pink eye
  - Decreased or no appetite (young children only)

If you have any COVID-19 symptoms (even if mild), it is recommended that you stay home (self-isolate) while you are sick.

#### This means:

- Staying home until you have no fever, and your symptoms are improving for at least 24 hours (or 48 hours if you have gastrointestinal symptoms such as vomiting and/or diarrhea).
- After isolating, wear a well-fitted, high-quality mask when **<u>Close contacts do not include</u>**: out in public for 10 days from when your symptoms started.
- Avoid non-essential visits to vulnerable individuals (e.g., seniors) and highest risk settings (e.g., hospitals, longterm care) for 10 days from when your symptoms started.
- Follow this advice whether you have tested for COVID-19 or not.
- Make sure you know if you are eligible for COVID-19 treatments and how to get tested and access treatment if you are eligible.

To find out how long you need to self-isolate, complete the COVID-19 Self-Assessment (www.ontario.ca/self-assessment). Follow Public Health Ontario's instructions on how to self-isolate (scan QR code to view information.)

If you tested positive for COVID-19, but do not have any symptoms, you are not required to self-isolate. You should self-monitor for symptoms and self-isolate if symptoms devel-

notify your close contacts, so that they can self-monitor for symptoms and self-isolate (stay home) if symptoms develop. A close contact is anyone who you spent time with when you were infectious.

If you have COVID-19 symptoms, your infectious period began 48 hours before your symptoms started.

If you do not have COVID-19 symptoms, your infectious period began 48 hours before your positive COVID-19 test date.

#### **Close contacts include:**

- Anyone you live with.
- Anyone who was within 2 meters (6 feet) of you for 15 minutes or more, without a well-fitted, high-quality mask.
- Anyone you had multiple close encounters with over a 24-• hour period (even if each was less than 15 minutes) without a well-fitted, high-quality mask.
- Anyone you had close, physical contact with (e.g., hugging) without a well-fitted, high-quality mask.

- People you had brief, close contact with while wearing a well-fitted, high-quality mask and/or with a barrier (e.g., Plexiglas) in place.
- People who you passed by you quickly
- People you greeted while staying 2 meters (6 feet) apart.
- Someone who made a delivery to you while you were selfisolating, but who did not have close contact with you.


Individuals with a weak immune system should isolate for at least 10 days (from symptom onset or positive test date) regardless if you have symptoms of COVID-19.
