AKWESASNE HEALING CENTRE AIMS TO ADDRESS HOMELESSNESS AND IMPROVE SERVICE ACCESSIBILITY

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne is nearing closer to the launch of its Akwesasne Healing Centre located in Cornwall, Ontario. The MCA Department of Community & Social Services (DCSS) has been developing the pilot project for the past several months with the goal being to address the issue of homelessness being experienced by Akwesasronon in and around the community.

The centre is located within the former General Hospital on Second Street and has been renovated to fit the needs of a homeless shelter, with an initial set up of beds for 8 men, 2 women, and 1 family. The facility is designed with emphasis on wellness, health and safety. Cozy healing rooms are available for counseling, bedrooms are large and comfortably furnished, for security there are separate areas for men and women.

Additional services will also be offered in the areas of health, mental health & addictions, and justice, and those services are geared toward any person in need. MCA and DCSS are working in collaboration with health officials, police and both Akwesasne and Cornwall councils to create the services that are most needed and which will improve the lives of community members.

"The statistics surrounding homelessness and drug addiction are troublesome and continue to rise," said Grand Chief Abram Benedict. "Our programs have worked to expand our existing services to help meet the needs. We see the Akwesasne Healing Centre as an initiative to meet the needs for our community members in and around Akwesasne. The additional services being built into the design will also go a long way in helping those who may have fallen through the cracks of public services. Bridging these gaps and connecting

people to the services they need is a high priority for our Council and staff."

On July 15, 2021, Ontario's Associate Minister of Mental Health & Addictions Michael Tibollo toured the facility and had a meeting with Council and the department staff who have created the centre. He pledged his support of the endeavor and commended Akwesasne for the initiative taken and the strength behind indigenous-based healing.

Information on criteria for the shelter and a complete listing of services offered will be publicized once the opening date for the Akwesasne Healing Centre is confirmed.

ONTARIO MOVING TO STEP THREE OF 'ROADMAP TO REOPEN'

Due to improvements in key public health areas and health systems, and increased province-wide vaccination rates, Ontario has moved to Step Three of its "Roadmap to Reopen" as of Friday, July 16, 2021, at 12:01 a.m.

Step Three of the Roadmap to Reopen includes, but is not limited to:

- Outdoor social gatherings and organized public events with up to 100 people, with limited exceptions
- Indoor social gatherings and organized public events with up to 25 people
- Indoor religious services, rites, and ceremonies, including weddings and funerals permitted with physical distancing
- Indoor dining permitted with no limits on the number of patrons per table with physical distancing and other restrictions still in effect
- Indoor sports and recreational fitness facilities to open subject to a maximum of 50% capacity of the indoor space. Capacity for indoor spectators is 50% of the usual seating capacity or 1,000 people, whichever is less. Capacity for outdoor spectators is 75% of the usual seating capacity, or 15,000 people, whichever is less
- Indoor meeting and event spaces permitted to operate with physical distancing and other restrictions still in effect and capacity limited to not exceed 50% capacity or 1,000 people (whichever is less)
- Essential and non-essential retail with capacity limited to the number of people that can maintain a physical distance of 6-feet
- Personal care service, including services requiring the removal of a face covering, with capacity limited to the number of people that can maintain a physical distance of 6-feet
- Museums, galleries, historic sites, aquariums, zoos,

landmarks, botanical gardens, science centres, casinos/bingo halls, amusement parks, fairs, and rural exhibitions, festivals, with capacity limited to not exceed 50% capacity indoors and 75% capacity outdoors

- Concert venues, cinemas, and theaters permitted to operate at up to 50% indoors or a maximum of 1,000 people for seated events (whichever is less), up to 75% capacity outdoors or a maximum of 5,000 people for unseated events (whichever is less), and up to 75% capacity outdoors or a maximum of 15,000 people for events with fixed seating (whichever is less)
- Real estate open houses with capacity limited to the number of people that can maintain a physical distance of 6-feet
- Indoor food or drink establishments where dance facilities are provided, including nightclubs and restobars, permitted up to 25% capacity or up to a maximum limit of 250 people (whichever is less)
- Face coverings in indoor public settings and physical distancing requirements remain in place throughout Step Three.

CANADA OPENING BORDER FOR VACCINATED TRAVELLERS; **U.S. KEEPING BORDER CLOSED FOR NOW (JULY 23)**

Mohawk Tribe are providing an update to the community on the U.S. - Canada border closure.

Canada announced that as of August 9, 2021, fully vaccinated American citizens will be allowed into Canada for non-essential travel (leisure, entertainment, etc.). A negative COVID-19 test is required prior to entry or return to Canada, and vaccinated individuals will be selected at random for on-arrival COVID-testing at ports of entry. On September 7, 2021, citizens from other countries will be allowed to enter Canada if vaccinated.

The United States announced that they are not yet opening up their border to any non-American citizens travelling for non-essential purposes. The U.S. will keep their border closed until at least August 21, 2021 at which time the next update will be provided.

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne and Saint Regis Akwesasronon who are registered status Indians in Canada have been exempt from the border closure since it was first declared; Akwesasronon have been permitted to continue crossing the border for both essential and non-essential purposes without COVID-19 test-ing or quarantine. This exemption for Akwesasne residents is unchanged. However, anyone visiting Akwesasne from other places of residence will be required to have proof of a negative COVID-19 test when arriving to Canada. Those not vaccinated are required to quarantine.

> The Canada Border Services Agency is advising the community that traffic may increase at the Corn-wall Port of Entry resulting in some adjustments to staffing, lanes and fluctuating wait times. The Domestic Lane pilot will continue to operate and the public is encouraged to use this lane when travelling domestically from Kawehno:ke (Cornwall Island).

MCA COMMUNITY INFORMATION: WHAT IS COMMON LAND?

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne (MCA) is providing the community information on the use of common lands in Akwesasne.

Common Land on a First Nation:

Common land is considered reserve land that is not under the lawful possession of an individual member. A member who has lawful possession of land is, in most cases, entitled to a certificate of possession or "CP".

By default, all land in the reserve is common land. In the northern portion of Akwesasne, common land is controlled by the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne. Reserve land is not owned by individuals but held in trust for the benefit of band members by the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne. The MCA can manage the land and can also allocate land to an individual member by resolution.

Who controls Common Land?

No individual member of Akwesasne can take exclusive possession of common land or any part of it. For example, individuals can not fence off a part of common land and build on it. The right of community members to use common lands for various purposes would be determined by the custom of the Mohawks of Akwesasne.

There are some specific cases that arise. For example, the MCA holds CPs for certain lands on which it has constructed facilities. The MCA has full control of these lands. In Akwesasne, if you have a need to use common land for any reason, please contact Mohawk Government Office at 613-575-2250.



MCA FINANCE COMMITTEE FILLING VACANCIES

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne is currently filling four (4) vacant seats on the Finance Committee:

- One (1) vacant seat for the district of Kana:takon, with a term of not less than three (3) years
- One (1) vacant seat for the district of Kawehno:ke, with a term of not less than three (3) years
- One (1) vacant seat for the district of Tsi Snaihne, with a term of not less than three (3) years
- One (1) vacant seat for a member at large, with term of not less than three (3) years

The Finance Committee is established to provide Council with advice and recommendations in order to support Council's decision-making process respecting the Financial Administration of Akwesasne. In the spirit of transparency, accountability and integrity the Finance Committee shall assist Council with safeguarding community assets by ensuring compliance with all relevant h laws and regulations.

The Honorarium rate for this position is determined by Council's Honorarium Policy, which is \$25-hourly for meetings, and training related sessions.

To qualify for appointment for the position, a person must:

- be a Member;
- have knowledge of Mohawk cultures and traditions;
- have good character, credibility and reputation in the Akwesasne community;
- have good communication skills;
- Shall be independent from the Mohawk Council of Executive Director, Heather Phillips

- be "in good standing" as defined in the Akwesasne (613) 575-2250 ext. 2120 Good Standing Policy;
- not be a Council member of the Mohawk Council of

Akwesasne; the Saint Regis Mohawk Tribal Council; or, the Mohawk Nation Council of Chiefs;

- not be an employee of the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne
- produce a valid certificate from the Canadian Police Information Centre (CPIC);
- have the means to participate in Finance committee whether it be held in person or in a virtual setting;
- attend and actively participate in training deemed essential for the successful operation of the Finance Committee;
- attend regularly scheduled Finance Committee meetings to conduct business and attend Public Meetings as scheduled;
- sign the Oath of Appointment within 30 days of appointment.

Interested candidates are required to complete an Mohawk Council of Akwesasne, Finance Committee Application, which is available at MCA, Executive Services (Administration 1 Building). Candidates are also required to submit a letter of interest on how they meet the criteria established in the Finance Committee Charter.

- A briefing was provided on a request from the Seaway International Bridge Corporation (SIBC) for a representative to provide input into the RFID bridge pass development project. Further follow up will be done with SIBC.
- Council received an update on community planning for the Every Child Matters Unity March.
- An update was provided on the annual evaluation for the Executive Director.
- Council discussed possible av-

- enues for mitigation on Hydro Quebec outages and will be followed up on.



- Council received a briefing on the current arrangements for shared working space and the space limitations amid COVID-19 restrictions.
- A briefing was provided on a recent tour and meeting with the
 Associate Minister of Mental Health and Addictions.
- Council discussed a request from Walpole Island First Nations for elected officials' salary ranges; a decision will be deferred to next week.
- An update was provided on the recent announcement of the

- warehouse being removed at the Port Lands.
- Council discussed a letter received from the Iroquois Woodland Metis requesting a meeting regarding the Iroquois Indian Head on the Iroquois Water Tower. Further research will be done regarding the Metis Group.
- Council agreed that all members of Council will have BMO signing authority.





COVID-19 Vaccine Fact Sheet

WHAT IS COVID-19?

COVID-19 is an infection caused by the coronavirus (SARS-CoV-2). It is passed from an infected person who coughs, breathes, sings, or talks (droplets from the mouth).

It is possible to have no symptoms and still spread the COVID-19 infection (asymptomatic).

HOW DOES THE COVID-19 VACCINES PROTECT AGAINST THE VIRUS?

The vaccine works by presenting your body with something that looks like the infection so that your immune system can learn how to produce its own natural protection.

This natural protection prevents infection if you come in contact with an individual who has COVID-19.

WHO CAN RECEIVE THE VACCINE?

The Pfizer BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine is approved for individuals 12 years of age and up.

The Moderna COVID-19 vaccine is approved for individuals 18 years of age and up.

A discussion with your primary healthcare provider can assist in the prevention of any complications from the vaccine.

HOW IS THE VACCINE ADMINISTERED?

The COVID-19 vaccine is administered via injection in two doses, given 21-28 days apart.

After receiving your first does of the COVID-19 vaccine, you will be provided with a follow up appointment for your second dose.

WHAT ARE THE SIDE EFFECTS OF THE VACCINE?

The most commonly reported side effects are pain at the injection site, tiredness, headache, fatigue, chills, joint pain, and mild fever.

These side effects typically subside after 1-2 days after injection.

MY SIDE EFFECTS AREN'T GOING AWAY. NOW WHAT?

If your side effects haven't subsided after a few days, contact your healthcare provider.

Contact emergency services if you experience any adverse reactions such as:

- Hives
- · Swelling of the face/mouth
- · High fever
- Serious drowsiness
- · Convulsions or seizure
- Numbness/"pins and needles"

COVID-19 Age 12-17 Fact Sheet

What is COVID-19?

COVID-19 is an infecition caused by the coronavirus (SARS-CoV-2), and is mainly passed from an infected person through coughing, sneezing, talking, breathing, or singing.

What are the symptoms of COVID-19?

Cough, shortness of breath, fever, chills, body aches, tiredness, loss of taste or smell. An infected person can also have no symptoms at all (asymptomatic).

How does the vaccine protect me from COVID-19?


The vaccine works by presenting something to your body that looks like the infection, causing your body to produce its own natural protection. The natural protection helps prevent infection if you come in contact with an individual who has COVID-19.

Who can receive the COVID-19 vaccine?

The Pfizer BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine is currently approved for individuals 12 years of age and older. The vaccine is administered in two doses, 21-28 days apart.

What are the side effects of the vaccine?

The most common reported side effects are pain/swelling at the injection site, mild fever, chills, body aches, and tiredness. Some experience no side effects at all.

THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SENDS WELL WISHES TO FORMER ACTING DIRECTOR




