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MCA EMERGENCY FOOD DISTRIBUTION PROVIDES THOUSANDS OF MEALS TO FAMILIES DURING PANDEMIC



Since March 16, staff and volunteers from the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne have been providing Emergency Food Packages to over 900 families per week. The EFP's contained basic pantry supplies for a family and fresh foods, based on supplies received. The final distribution was held on May 15th. An alternative for families with continued need will be announced shortly.

AKWESASNE CONTINUES PRECAUTIONS DURING TIME OF MOURNING (JUNE 3, 2020)

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne (MCA) and the Saint Regis Mohawk Tribe (SRMT) express our deepest condolences to all community members affected by the loss of a loved one. The ongoing global pandemic the pandemic however, large gatherings have made makes it difficult to be able to express our heartfelt sympathies and console our fellow community members as we normally would.

The MCA and the SRMT is reminding our community that physical distancing and the gathering of large groups are restrictions that continue to apply, even in times of grieving. The recommended precautions are safeguards to limit your individual risk and exposure and ultimately the community at large against the spread of the COVID-19 virus.

Funeral homes that service the Akwesasne community are governed by their respective licensing authorities and those authorities have instructed the funeral homes to follow strict guidelines to protect the families they serve and the staff of the funeral homes. We have informed local funeral homes that wake services in homes and elsewhere within the community are not allowed at this time. We respectfully request that the community of Akwesasne continue to support and adhere to the guidelines and restrictions in place.

"The funeral homes have an understanding of our community's customs and are doing their very best to accommodate our community members wishes during evident the need for additional protective measures to prevent the spread of COVID-19 in Akwesasne. We ask that everyone continue to follow all prescribed guidelines to help keep the grieving family members and each other safe during their time of mourning," shared the Saint Regis Mohawk Tribal Council.

The rapidly changing global pandemic has altered all of our lives and forced us to make unprecedented changes. We encourage our community to utilize the options offered by local funeral homes for live-stream viewing and providing online messages of condolences, as a way to express condolences to the grieving family.

EMERGENCY MEASURES REMAIN IN EFFECT FOR AKWESASNE (MAY 27, 2020)

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne (MCA) and the Saint Regis Mohawk Tribe (SRMT) held a conference call on May 26, 2020 to discuss concerns related to the ongoing COVID-19 Pandemic.

At this time, we are reminding individuals that Akwesasne remains under a State of Emergency and all emergency measures taken continue to be in effect.

Community members are asked to continue adhering to all the preventive and protective measures authorized by our respective Councils.

Some of these measures clude, but are not limited to, the following:

- A community curfew is in place from 10:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. throughout Akwesasne. Community members are required to stay home and off the roads during these hours.
- It is recommended that community members remain within a 50-mile/80-kilometer radius of Akwesasne.
- Community members who travel outside this radius are required to quarantine (if they have no symptoms) or isolate (if they have or develop symptoms) for 14 days upon their return.

munity, it is best that you not travel outside the 50-mile/80-kilometer radius during the State of Emergency.

Both MCA and SRMT indicate that the State of Emergency will continue until COVID-19 no longer poses a threat to the health, safety, and welfare of our community.

APPLICATION ASSISTANCE FOR THE CANADA EMERGENCY STUDENT BENEFIT

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne would like to inform post-secondary students and recent graduates attending a college/university in Canada or abroad (i.e. United States) that beginning Friday, May 15, coronavirus aid applications will be available for submission. Students are being asked to submit their applications for the new benefit program over four days, depending on the month of their birth. To be eligible, you must be a registered Indian through Indigenous Services Canada or a Canadian Citizen.

The Canada Emergency Student Benefit (CESB) is aimed at assisting those students who are unemployed or making less than \$1,000 a month due to the CO-VID-19 pandemic. Eligible students and graduates include those who are currently enrolled in a post-secondary institution, have graduated since December 2019, or are enrolling in a post-secondary program that begins before February 1, 2021.

ing Canada Emergency Response Benefit (CERB) or COVID-19.

Employment Insurance (EI) are not eligible to receive CESB. For those not eligible to CERB, they can apply for the student aid program through the Canada Revenue Agency to receive payments of \$1,250 per month between May and August. Individuals who have disabilities, children under 12, or other dependents may be eligible for \$2,000 per month. Applicants can expect their payments within three to five business days once deemed eligible if they are set up for direct deposit.

Akwesasne Career & Employment Support Services (ACESS) will be providing assistance to those who want to apply for the Canada Emergency Student Benefit. For assistance, please contact Youth Coordinator Nathan Sunday. Nathan will be available by appointment only on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday between 9 a.m. - 11 a.m. To reach Nathan during those hours, phone 613-575-2626.

COMMUNITY PARKS & PLAYGROUNDS CLOSED UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne would like to remind the community that all park amenities, including playgrounds, are closed until further notice.

The following recreational areas are closed and will have signage displayed to notify community members:

- AMBE school playgrounds
- Tennis courts (Kawehno:ke)

These measures are being taken as a precaution for the health and safety of Akwesasronon. MCA encourages everyone to stay home, except for essential travel, and continue to practice physical distancing. Social distancing as it applies to COVID-19 is defined as "remaining out of congregate settings, avoiding mass gatherings, and maintaining distance (approximately 6 feet or 2 meters) from others when possible."

GRASSE RIVER PROJECT INFORMATION SESSIONS CANCELED

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne (MCA) and Saint Regis Mohawk Tribe (SRMT) are informing the community that, due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, the public informational sessions held by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) on the Grasse River Project will not be held, in accordance with social distancing requirements.

The presentation that Arconic would have given at the public meetings has been uploaded to the website, www.thegrasseriver.com, under the "What's New" tab. The presentation includes a project overview, review of work completed in 2019, planned 2020 activities, plans for air and water monitoring, and boating and swimming safety.

The Grasse River Project has been delayed and will commence later this month however, with the COVID-19 An aerial shot of the Grasse River in Massena, NY.

Pandemic, EPA is taking additional precautions and Arconic developed a comprehensive COVID-19 Project Health and Safety Plan. A summary of the plan will also be posted on www.thegrasseriver.com website prior to the in-river construction commencing in mid-May.

The schedule for future U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Open-House Information Sessions on the Grasse River Project will be shared once determined.



REMINDER: KEEP OUR COMMUNITY SAFE — TIE UP YOUR LOOSE DOG

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne received multiple reports of dogs being allowed to run loose, which has resulted in community members being bitten by dogs while the person is walking, or jogging on the roadway.

At this time, to protect and maintain the safety of the community, the Conservation Program will be instructed to capture any dog that is seen running loose.

Due to COVID-19, community members are unable to enter community buildings and staffing capacity is limited. to ensure everyone remains safe.

Please be notified that any animals picked up by the Conservation Program will be immediately sent to the pound: dogs will not be returned to their owners, nor will owners be contacted.

We want to keep our animals safe and ask you to do the same. We want to ensure that community members remain safe and not injured due to avoidable animal bites. We are looking to the community and pet owners to be part of the solution. Please tie up pets

MCA LONG TERM CARE FACILITY TESTING PROTOCOLS

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne's Department does not suspect COVID-19. of Health manages two long term care facilities -Tsiionkwanonhso:te Longterm Care Facility and lakhihsohtha Lodge. The MCA Department of Health follows the directives issued by the Ontario Ministry of Long-Term Care for COVID-19 protocols that are implemented in each home. The Ministry released a directive to conduct COVID-19 testing on all residents and staff working in long term care facilities, even if they are asymptomatic.

MCA's Community Health Program has requested an additional 190 test kits from the Eastern Ontario Health Unit to accommodate this directive. Families of the residents and staff working at both facilities are being notified of this requirement. This community notice is being provided to assure the community that this is a precautionary step directed by the Ministry to reduce the risk of an outbreak.

Tsiionkwanonhso:te Longterm Care Facility and lakhihsohtha Lodge staff are prepared with personal protective equipment (e.g. masks, gowns, gloves) and isolation protocols if a resident does test positive for COVID-19. All results from testing are protected information and will not be released to the public.

HOSPITAL REFERRAL PROTOCOLS FROM LONG **TERM CARE FACILITIES**

Each Akwesasne long term care facility requires different levels of care and skillset of health care workers. On rare occasions during overnight hours if a resident requires medical care beyond what is available at the facility, a physician may advise that the resident be transported to a local hospital for radiology or other treatment. If that happens, the resident of a long term care facility being transferred to a Cornwall hospital will be tested for COVID-19 even if the referring physician

The Ontario Ministry of Health COVID-19 directives being implemented by the Eastern Ontario Health Unit help to screen people who are suspected or confirmed of having COVID-19 throughout the health care system. First Nations are considered a high-risk population for COVID-19 because of the high rate of individuals with respiratory issues (e.g. asthma), heart disease, and diabetes. Long term care facilities are also considered a high-risk population for COVID-19 because of the age of residents, proximity within homes, and pre-existing medical conditions.

This precautionary measure to test all residents of Akwesasne's long term care facilities for COVID-19 when they arrive at a hospital in Cornwall is a standard practice. In Ontario of the 1,300 reported deaths from CO-VID-19 cases, 927 deaths happened in a long term care facility. The MCA Department of Health continues to implement internal precautions along with public restrictions to long term care facility property to limit the risk of a COVID-19 outbreak.

Help Respect and Protect our Elders

Warmer weather is on the horizon and the residents of both Tsiionkwanonhso:te Longterm Care Facility and lakhihsohtha Lodge are looking forward to enjoying their outdoor spaces. The healthcare workers at both facilities have been working hard to implement the ever-changing guidelines for long term care facilities. Allowing residents to sit on their verandas while maintaining physical distancing is a welcome activity that our elders are looking forward to.

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne's Department of Health is expanding restrictions of visitors for both long term care facilities to include no visitors on the property surrounding the buildings, effective immediately.

The expanded restriction prohibiting visitors on the this time.

property includes visits through windows. Visitors coming onto the property of the long term care facilities limit the ability of residents to use their outdoor spaces. This restriction is being implemented to protect residents and staff working in each home. Help our elders by respecting this restriction so they can benefit from good weather and fresh air.

Family members of residents can still see their loved one using virtual services like FaceTime and Zoom video conferencing. Both Tsiionkwanonhso:te Longterm Care Facility and lakhihsohtha Lodge have iPads and tablets available to make those arrangements on request. Virtual meetings are the best way to interact at this time without compromising the health and safety of residents, and is highly encouraged at this time.

HOW TO CARE FOR PETS AND OTHER ANIMALS IF YOU HAVE COVID-19 OR YOU OR YOUR PETS HAVE BEEN EXPOSED TO COVID-19

There have been limited reports of animals becoming infected with COVID-19. There is currently no evidence that pets or domestic animals play a significant role in the spread of COVID-19. If you are sick, it is recommended that you avoid contact with pets and other animals, just like you would other people, until more is known.

Keep your pets in your home

- If you are sick, ask someone else in your home who is not sick to care for your pets.
- If everyone in the home is sick or you live alone, it is still best.



Consider this if pets must be moved to another home

- Individuals at higher risk for severe COVID-19 illness (people over 65 years or with underlying health conditions) should avoid being temporary caregivers to exposed animals, if possible.
- Keep the pets isolated to one area of the home in order to minimize contact with other animals or people, if possible.

Avoid close or prolonged contact with pets

 Try to avoid the following as much as possible: snuggling them, kissing them, letting them lick you, sharing food with them, or letting them sleep in your bed or sit on your lap.



Keep pets away from people and other animals

- Keep pets indoors as much as possible
- When dogs are outside, they should be on a leash and at least two metres



away from other people and animals.

Take precautions when providing care for pets

- Wash your hands with soap and water or use an alcohol-based hand rub immediately before and after touching the pets, their food or supplies.
- Try not to cough or sneeze near the pets. Always cough or sneeze into your elbow or a tissue and clean your hands afterwards.
- Always avoid touching your face

Monitor your pets for any signs of illness if they have been exposed to COVID-19

 If your pet shows signs of illness, call your veterinarian to determine if your animal needs to be seen at a clinic or can be managed at home.

Prevent exposure to livestock and poultry


- Livestock producers should:
 - -Follow all existing farm biosecurity measures
 - -Limit contact with the animals to only contact that is needed to provide their care.
- If possible, do not care for animals if you have:
 - -been diagnosed with COVID-19 or have symptoms of a respiratory illness.
 - -been exposed to someone who is sick with a respiratory illness or
 - -travelled outside of Canada in the past 14 days.
- If you need to care for your animals yourself:
 - -Follow basic infection prevention and control measures as outlined above and
 - -Clean/disinfect any equipment you touch that will come into contact with the animals.







IN MEMORIAM: JAY "TEONIETATHE" BENEDICT

Prologue: As of April 1, 2020, the Department of Technical Services (DTS) is now known as the Department of Infrastructure and Housing. More information will be provided about department changes in the July issue of the MCA Newsletter. For now, this months' article is dedicated solely to honour the late Director of Technical Services, Jay Benedict.

It was with great sadness that our department, the MCA organization, and the community learned of the passing of Jay Benedict.



Our heartfelt sympathy goes out to his loving wife Lisa, his children Dorian and Janisa and their spouses, Jay's grandchildren Taeys, Ever, Kansas, Kennen and Indi Mae, his mother and father Pat and Buster, his brothers Keith, Billy, Willie, Quinn and their spouses, his many aunts, uncles, nieces, nephews and cousins. Jay was an institution in his own right in being a dedicated employee of the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne within the Department of Technical Services for thirty-nine years.

The accomplishments he has made for the community resulted in infrastructure of 47 facility assets covering 52,000 square meters of floor space, 41km of water mains, 47km of road ways and bridges, that service 1500 residential units and 40+ private businesses that operate throughout all of Mohawk Council districts. These assets support the entire economy, health and well-being of the Akwesasne community and its 15,000 members. He was a visionary and had the experience to turn that vision into action. Unfortunately, the Pandemic has thus far prevented our community from having a gathering for him, and so, we have reached out to Jay's colleagues, co-workers, employers and friends with the opportunity to say a few words about Jay so that his family can know how important he was to all of us and what his work meant to our community.

The following are the results of those submissions for this article.

'With a heavy heart I recall my memories of Director of Technical Services, Jay Benedict. I first encountered Jay while I was in high school, over two decades ago, as I was accepted for a summer job position within DTS. I was always amazed at the command and control he exhibited during meetings, with conversations with staff, or clients. From afar I considered him one of the mentors that shaped and guided my career path into the construction industry and it made the decision to pursue a career in Civil Engineering an easy one. Little did I realize at the time his guidance toward me was always for the best of Akwesasne, like all the hard decisions he had to make, he always had the community's best interests in mind. Even when he drew a line in the sand on an issue: as stubborn as his convictions could be sometimes, though at times I could not fully see the path ahead, he had a reason, the foresight for the benefit of the community in mind. 

'As a new employee to MCA in March of 1991, it didn't take long to realize the leadership and vision of the Late Jay C. Benedict, Director of the Department of Technical Services. Jay had already been on site with MCA many years before that. Akwesasne was going through some very challenging events in that time frame, but steadfastly Jay remained focused on the betterment of our community as a whole, and insisted we did the same. Through his leadership and perseverance, our team realized many, many, much-needed facilities and projects. The Health Facility, Kana:takon School, the Water and Wastewater treatment facilities, replacing old failing water line's in Kana:takon, adding the water line's in Tsi Snaihne, Kawehno:ke, under the river to the Snye District, Road reconstructions in all three districts, health and safety concerns overall were never off the list of things to do. ning Study map, it got done later, never dropped only planned into the funding scheme we had to abide by. Jay had an amazing understanding of the funding and submission process that Indian Affairs applied to our community. Every project took up to five years to see to fruition. As we developed and continually improved, Jay was able to direct the team and projects started getting approved sometimes within three years or less. Having a 'shovel ready' project was the new norm. Jay ensured we had that mentality to succeed. Get the documents in order, substantiate the need, verify the finance, the project scope, the need for the 'Class A' estimates, and make it harder and harder for Indian Affairs to say no. That was the normal process Jay insisted on from all of us. Through Jay's leadership our community succeeded leaps and bounds over others. We are considered a leader in many areas; Technical Services was considered one of the best in Canada. "How did you do that", we were always asked? Credit is due to Jay and his insistence that we did our best every day; it was never about a district - it was always executed, and if it wasn't on the approved Capital Plan- about our community as a whole. In honor of workers





'I had the privilege of working with Jay Benedict for over 30 years - from a time in the late 1980's when Akwesasne's infrastructure either did not exist or was on the verge of breaking down. Jay was young, committed to serving and ensuring the development of the community infrastructure required to ensure the health & safety of community members. He was a key member of management and of Council's negotiation teams: always thoroughly prepared, he brought knowledge, passion, logic & consistency to the negotiation table. He always had an eye on the future & on the next project ensuring that: feasibility studies & designs

able; that designs reflected actual current and future growth needs & current standards; that MCA developed the inhouse professional & technical expertise necessary to manage each project & to hold both funders & external contractors accountable to Council; that all contracts awarded required the inclusion of Akwesasne contractors and consultants; & that strong relationships were developed with professional partners. From the perspective of Canada and the provinces these concepts were ground breaking in the 1980's and 1990's when most First Nation infrastructure projects were managed by the federal & provincial bureaucracies reflecting standards that were twenty to thirty years old. It is a direct reflection of Jay & the DTS team he lead on behalf of the Council & the community, that the hard work that began in the late 1980's to the present has become an integral part of the landscape of

Akwesasne today - modern water & sewage treatment plants, elders facilities, daycare and recreation centres, health facilities, roads, safe schools & office facilities to name a few.'


