INDIGENOUS SERVICES CANADA ISSUES ADVISORY ON NEW COVID-19 VARIANT WAVE

Dr. James Brooks, MD, FRCPC, of Indigenous Services Canada (ISC) has issued an advisory that the new variant of COVID-19, BA.2, is quickly becoming the dominant strain among new infections across Ontario and First Nations communities. Despite having the tools to address the ongoing pandemic, the COVID-19 virus continues to surprise health officials and experts with its ability to change and find ways to transmit more efficiently.

BA.2 is part of the Omicron family and shares most of the same characteristics as the current BA.1 Omicron variant. The most important distinction is that BA.2 is more transmissible than BA.1, meaning that it will infect more people, faster. Current information indicates that the disease is not more severe with BA.2 infection. While re-infection is rare, it is possible with BA.2 after a BA.1 infection.

During the BA.2 wave, we ask community members to continue to follow public health guidelines and take steps to avoid infection, such as wearing a mask, social distancing when gathering with non-household members, and consider receiving the COVID-19 vaccine. If you are demonstrating any symptoms of COVID-19, stay home and use testing measures appropriately. Please note that a positive rapid antigen test is considered a positive case of COVID-19 and no longer requires a confirmatory PCR test.

Vaccination against COVID-19 continues to be the most effective form of prevention against severe illness and serious outcomes of COVID-19 infection. Please consider receiving your first, second, third, or fourth (where indicated) dose of the COVID-19 vaccine.

U.S. DISTRICT COURT RULES FAVOURABLY ON AKWESASNE BOUNDARY

that a positive ruling has been received related to the New York State land claim. On March 14, 2022, U.S. District Court Judge Lawrence Kahn ruled in a summary judgement that the boundary of Akwesasne set in the 1796 Treaty - ratified by the U.S. Congress that same year - are still the valid boundaries of Akwesasne, and the State's illegal taking of Akwesasne land in the 19th century did not affect its treaty-guaranteed boundaries.

The immediate next steps with regard to the New York State land claim are not immediately defined; however, the court ruling supports Akwesasne's decades long claim that land was taken illegally from our community members.

The main New York State land claim was filed in two Salli Benedict."

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne is pleased to share cases in 1982 by the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne (named St. Regis Mohawk Band of Indians, at the time). In 1989 the Saint Regis Mohawk Tribe and Mohawk Nation Council of Chiefs filed a claim as well. In 1992 a federal judge combined the three cases and the three councils have worked together in the pursuit of land claim resolutions since.

> "For decades, leadership staff and have worked together to pursue this land claim and our common position that Akwesasne voice lands were taken illegally," said MCA Grand Chief Abram Benedict. "This ruling is a very promising step as it sends a message to New York State and county courts that our land claim has validity. We acknowledge that this is the result of years of hard work by our staff including the late

ONTARIO LIFTS MASK MANDATES IN MOST PUBLIC SPACES, SCHOOLS MCA, AMBE CONTINUE MASK MANDATE

for schools, retail settings, and most other indoor public spaces, as of March 21st. The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne (MCA) will be extending their mask mandate for MCA buildings, facilities, and healthcare settings until April 4th, after which MCA will reassess the mask mandate. The mask mandate will not apply to businesses or organizations outside of MCA.

Settings such as long-term care homes, healthcare facilities, and public transportation systems will keep mask mandates in place until the end of April. All remaining public health rules are expected to come to an end at the end of April as public health indicators have improved enough throughout Ontario to remove masks and other rules associated with the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Ontario government has lifted the mask mandate the mask mandate in the beginning of April. AMBE is going to utilize a slow process in removing the mask mandate within the schools; if COVID-19 case numbers continue to be low, masks will be worn when students are on the bus and in common areas. Students will be able to remove their masks when seated at their desks.

> The protection of MCA staff, AMBE students, and community members, particularly our vulnerable populations, are our utmost priority. MCA and AMBE will provide the community with notice when its mask mandates will be ending.

MCA RESCINDS PROOF OF VACCINATION MCR

PUBLIC HEALTH MEASURES REMAIN ACTIVE

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne (MCA) is informing the community that they have rescinded MCR 2021 / 2022 - #183, removing "proof of vaccination" requirements for any public event held within a Mohawk Council of Akwesasne facility. Public health measures will remain in place, such as wearing a mask, social distancing, sanitizing and disinfecting. MCA's Department of Health (DOH) and Emergency Operations Center (EOC) will continue to monitor any impacts COVID-19 has on the community during this reopening period.

With the removal of the proof of vaccination requirement, community recreation facilities are able to open under normal capacity (100%) for patrons, spectators, volunteers, and workers. Proof of vaccination will no

longer be required to access and utilize MCA facilities and recreation centers. Event plans will no longer be required to be submitted to the EOC. Recreation centers will have to continue to enforce public health measures which includes mask wearing when accessing the recreation centers, screening for COVID-19 symptoms for those entering the facilities, sanitizing and disinfecting, and social distancing (except for couples of families from the same household/family unit).

- Have been a resident in the Mohawk Territory of Akwesasne for at least ten (10) years and within the last fifteen (15) years .
- Have demonstrable knowledge and life experience of the Mohawks of Akwesasne.
- Be willing to put the collective, best interest of the Mohawks of Akwesasne before personal interest.
- Not be an elected official of either the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne or the Saint Regis Mohawk Tribe.
- Not be a member of the Technical Working Committee of the Akwesasne Community Trust
- Never have been convicted of an offense under Akwesasne Law, an indictable offense in Canada or a felony in the United States.
- Not have been convicted of an offense under Akwesasne Law, a summary conviction in Canada or a misdemeanor in the United States in the past five (5) years.

FAREWELL MESSAGE FROM ENTEWATATHA:WI PROGRAM MANAGER, PETER GARROW

I sometimes feel as if I am as old as the Indian Act and feel the wounds of this oppressive piece of legislation placed on all of us, without our consent. Well, I have tried hard in over 45 years of public service to point out the negative aspects of living and operating under the Indian Act and now it is time to pass on this quest to younger minds with more energy and hopefully with the same passion as I have demonstrated. I pass this on with the knowledge that there are a number of social actions currently underway to make substantive changes for the betterment of First Nations People which includes Akwesasronon. One of these is Self Government negotiations with Canada to establish a new legislative relationship with Canada that will guide Akwesasne into the future.

This has been a great opportunity for me to be part of a great team within MCA working on this important project that will encompass many, if not, all MCA departments. I have stated to others that this has been the most important work I have been engaged in because it is visionary, with a defined purpose, to control and manage our affairs, which we are more than capable of doing, while protecting our rights and forfeiting absolutely nothing.

DOH ANNOUNCES UPDATES TO LTC COVID-19 VISITATION POLICIES (MARCH 14)

The Department of Health is informing the community lodge/LTC): on updates to the COVID-19 Visitation Policies for the lakhihsohtha Lodge and the Tsiionkwanonhso:te Longterm Care Facility. The Ministry of Long-Term Care has provided the following updates to the Visitation Policies:

• Masks will continue to be required at all times when for residents regardless of vaccination status in the LTC facilities. Eating and drinking is not permitted except where a home is able to provide a designated space.

• Up to four visitors (including designated caregivers) per resident at a time (unless in outbreak or quarantine status)

• Visitors are expected to follow the individual home's vaccination policies

• There will be a maximum of four (4) designated caregivers (unless previously designated) per resident When a home, lodge, or LTC is in non-outbreak status, the following visitation policies are in effect:

• Physical distancing with the resident is not required

• Visitors may support the resident in the dining room and join in planned activities

• Visitors must be screened and tested to enter the home, lodge, or LTC

When a home, lodge, or LTC is identified to be in outbreak status, the following visitation policies are in effect:

• Only one designated caregiver per visitor may provide support in the residents' room or quarantine room • General visitation is not permitted, unless visiting a resident receiving end-of-life care

The following resident absences are permitted when the home, lodge, or LTC is in non-outbreak status (medical masks are required when residents are out of the facility tending to matters away from the home/

- Medical, Compassionate, or Palliative care
- Short-term essential (less than 24 hours)

• Short-term social (less than 24 hours); permitted for residents regardless of vaccination status

• Temporary social (2+ days or overnight); permitted

• Organized events or social gatherings; no cohorting required; limited capacity in a room; social group activities should be in small groups

• Communal dining: cohorting of residents and physical distancing not required; physical distance between dining tables as much as possible; buffet and familystyle permitted; caregivers and visitors may join residents while remaining masked at all times

The following absences are not permitted when the home, lodge, or LTC is in outbreak status:

- Short-term social (less than 24 hours)
- Temporary social (2+ days or overnight)
- Organized events or social gatherings (permission will be based on the advice of the public health unit)
- Communal dining (in-suite dining will be permitted)

SPRING CLEANING

Spring cleaning is right around the corner and Akwesasne Mohawk Police Service would like to remind the community to be aware of some hidden dangers that you may encounter while cleaning in your neighborhood.

XaXaXaXaXaX

1. Hypodermic Needles and Syringes: If you located a syringe or hypodermic needles please do not touch it and contact your local law enforcement agency. Officers are trained to deal with this type of biohazard.

2. Suspicious Powders or Pills: Fentanyl is a powerful synthetic opioid. This drug is 50 to 100 times stronger than morphine, even a tiny bit can be fatal. Fentanyl can be absorbed into the body via inhalation, oral exposure or ingestion, and skin contact. If you observed suspicious powders or pills contact your local law enforcement agency immediately and do not attempt to move or transport these substances.

3. Suspicious bottles containing fluids: Methamphetamine (Meth) is a central nervous system stimulant. It affects chemicals in the brain and nerves that contribute to hyperactivity and impulse control. Bottles and cans are now being used as makeshift drug labs to produce meth. These chemicals used to produce meth may cause toxic fumes or even explosions when mixed together.

If you observe something that you believe is suspicious contact your local police service immediately. If you come in contact with any of these dangerous substances, please seek medical attention immediately.
