Harry worked for many years in the Traditional Medicines Program, sharing his knowledge of our traditional teachings and medicines with clients who accessed the program. Harry was instrumental in developing and establishing the "Medicine Wheel Program" for Traditional Medicines, a program that is still used today.

Harry had also served indigenous youth by working as a counselor for MCA's Ionkwanonhsasetsi Adolescent Group Home. 
