



DISTRIBUTION NETWORK









ELECTRICAL INSPECTIONS OF LINE HTD-235

Inspection performed in november 2021, repairs were done in 2022

- **Approximately 30 anomalies were identified for the entire line during this inspection and seven have been identified as having a potential outage effect and were already corrected.**

New inspection performed in February 2023 on the line along the border.

- **Dangerous trees were identified and will be cut down.**

New inspection performed in the community on March 31st 2023


- **A few more anomalies were detected and 6 will be corrected this week. (broken insulators, stripped conductor, burnt pole)**

Out of these anomalies, seven have been identified as having a "potential outage effect"

VOLTAGE IMBALANCE / THREE-PHASE CUSTOMERS

Conducted in December 2022

- In previous meetings with the community, a voltage imbalance issue was flagged.
- To correct the situation, we rebalanced the loads on the line HTD-235. The voltages are therefore “closer” and the voltage imbalance has been reduced to below the 2% threshold.
- The voltages for a three-phase customer in the community on January 21, 2023, were A: 338 V, B: 336 V and C: 339 V. This difference in the voltages represents an imbalance of 0.5% which is normal.

UPDATE OF THE ACTIVITY

The activity is still ongoing and should be completed by mid June

- **Pruning start date: Week of March 20**
- **Felling and clearing start date: Week of April 10**
- **8 tree pruners, including 4 Mohawk contractors**
- **The whole activity lasted more than 2 months**

35% of outages in HTD-235 are caused by vegetation

How Hydro-Québec clears vegetation near power lines



Pruning

Pruning involves cutting tree branches to ensure safe clearance around medium-voltage lines.



Clearing

Clearing is a process that involves cutting taller trees down to ground level while maintaining low-growing vegetation that will not encroach on medium-voltage lines.



Felling weakened trees

Trees that show signs of structural weakness (partially uprooted trees, trees damaged in a storm, etc.) and are in danger of falling on distribution lines are cut down (felled).



Microgrid Analysis

Microgrid



What is a microgrid?

A smaller version of a typical power system

Main goals

- Reduce greenhouse gas emissions
- Improve energy resilience and independence (against weather conditions, among other things)

Three key elements

- Local generation of energy
- Energy storage (electrochemical, thermal, etc.)
- Smart load management

What does it take to integrate a microgrid?

- **Defined boundaries** (enclosing a few km² at most, or service quality suffers)
 - No backup line
 - Outages due to events **upstream of defined boundaries**
- Average outage 15 minutes to 6 hours at most (**with an outage of less than 15 minutes, the microgrid would not be able to correct the problem given the time required to restart the microgrid**)
- **Little vegetation** near distribution lines within the defined boundaries
 - Load within defined boundaries = **1 to 3 MW**

THE AKWESASNE GRID

- **The analysis covered the entire area of the Québec part of the community (22 km²) and a load of 6 MW.** Given the large area and the significant load, a microgrid would require a considerable investment. Ideal conditions for a microgrid are a small area (about 5 km²) and an electric load of 1 to 3 MW.
- **For the microgrid to help improve system quality,** outages must be infrequent within the area of the microgrid if they are to be covered by it. A study of outages over the last 10 years shows that a significant number of outages took place within the area of the community.
- An analysis of outages over the last three years demonstrates that of the **184 service interruptions** during this time only **23 (outages lasting more than 15 minutes and less than 6 hours) could have been avoided with the help of a microgrid.**
- **A microgrid is not a good solution: the characteristics of the target area (22 km² and a load of 6 MW) are far from ideal; and it would not dramatically improve service quality.**

GRAND CHIEF MONTHLY REPORT

APRIL / ONERAHTOHKHA

2023

APRIL 2, 2023, CHIEFS OF ONTARIO LEADERSHIP COUNCIL

On the evening of April 2, 2023, I traveled to Ottawa to participate in a Chiefs of Ontario (COO) Leadership Council meeting at the Westin Hotel. The meeting was held ahead of the upcoming Assembly of First Nations (AFN) Special Chiefs Assembly on the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples. The Ontario Regional Chief provided the Leadership Council with an update from a recent AFN Executive Committee meeting and reported that the investigation report on the workplace investigation against the Nation Chief was not completed. The Regional Chief explained the challenges and delays being faced by the investigator but reported the final would be ready in May. The Leadership Council received a briefing from the COO secretariat on the upcoming resolutions coming to the Chiefs in Assembly at the AFN. The leadership council discussed concerns with few resolutions coming forward to the AFN and agreed to work to resolve the concerns ahead of the resolutions being voted on.

APRIL 3, 4, 5, 2023, ASSEMBLY OF FIRST NATIONS SPECIAL CHIEFS ASSEMBLY

On April 3, 4, 5, 2023, I travelled to Ottawa to participate in the Assembly of First Nations (AFN) Special Chiefs Assembly (SCA). The AFN had called for SCA on the United Nations Declaration National Action Plan. Several resolutions had not been considered by the Chiefs at the Assembly in December were considered by the Chiefs over the three days. A significant amount of time was spent on the resolutions and the Chiefs debated each one. A series of plenary dialogue sessions took place on the United Nations Declaration and the National Action plan being proposed by the Government of Canada. Several of the Chiefs spoke in favor of the action plan, and a several of Chiefs spoke against the action plan. Unfortunately, due to a prolonged power outage in Akwesasne I was unable to attend the last day of the assembly.

APRIL 3, 2023, TREATY BORDER ALLIANCE

On the afternoon of April 3, 2023, I participated in the Jay Treaty Border Alliance (JTBA) Governance Circle Quarterly meeting at the Canada Border Service Agency (CBSA) office in Ottawa. Recently, Kelly Atcon the Vice President of Strategic Policy was named the Indigenous champion for CBSA and the co-convenor for the governance circle. At the April 3, 2023, meeting the co-convenors for the right of entry technical table provided an update on the work and investigation they have been doing on legislative amendment options. At the meeting it was announced that the border crossing experience technical table would be hosting its inaugural meeting in the coming weeks. The governance table discussed the possibility of the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne submitting a funding proposal to support the coordination of the JTBA tables. – The representatives

from Canada provided an overview of upcoming engagement the government is going to undertake related to the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous People (UNDRIP), the international border and Indigenous People. The representatives agreed that a high-level table between the Chiefs and the ministers would be scheduled in the next two – three months.

APRIL 5, 2023, UNITED NATIONS DECLARATION ON THE RIGHTS OF INDIGENOUS PEOPLES

On the evening of April 5, 2023, the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne (MCA) hosted a presentation, consultation session at the Westin Hotel. Over the last eight months the MCA had been hosting a series of engagement session on the Jay Treaty and the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous People. On the evening of April 5, 2023, we presented the preliminary finds from the engagements session. The participants of the evening session provided additional input on their views of the Jay Treaty and border crossing rights. The participants also asked several questions related to what we heard on the engagement sessions.

APRIL 11 TO 17, 2023, OUT OF OFFICE

From April 11 to April 17, 2023, I was out of the office spending some time with my family.

APRIL 17, 2023, COUNCIL MEETING

MCRs PASSED: Approval of (2) amendments to Akwesasne Canada funding agreement; Approval of Revenues and Expenditures Schedule for MCA Canada funding agreement; Approval of phase 4 for Akwesasne Cannabis Law; Approval of rescind upgrade loan (no longer needed); Approval of (3) upgrade loans to community

member; Approval of Correction Service Canada Program development agreement; Approval of contract renewal with Dr. Marie-France Levac; Approval of lease agreement with Rogers Telecommunications; Approval to downgrade MCA's COVID-19 Emergency Declaration; Approval of agreement with Ontario for probation services; Approval of (2) land transfers to community member (loan paid off); Approval of legal service contract for Nation Building program; Approval of representative on implementation committee.

APRIL 18, 2023, MINISTER LAFRENIERE



On April 18, 2023, I travelled to Quebec City to meet Minister Ian Lafrenière at the Quebec National Assembly. Minister Lafrenière had invited the Akwesasne Mohawk Police Chief, Chief Edward and myself to the national assembly for lunch and to observe question period. The minister joined us for lunch at the dinner hall inside the national assembly prior to us observing the question period.

Following the question period, we accompanied the Minister to his Ministerial office to discuss a number of initiatives the minister was working on. At the meeting of April 18, 2023, we discussed the current licensing barriers related to French language and our licensed professional in Akwesasne. The minister informed us that recently his ministry was conducted a series of engagement session to discuss the possibility of him introducing an Indigenous language and culture act for Quebec. We also discussed the recent increase of illegal immigrants crossing through Akwesasne. The minister committed to continuing to work to find solutions for Akwesasne.

APRIL 18, 19, 2023, ASSEMBLY OF FIRST NATIONS QUEBEC AND LABRADOR



On April 18 and 19, 2023, Chief Edward and I participated in the Assembly of First Nations Quebec and Labrador (AFNQL) Chiefs General Assembly in Quebec City. On the morning of the 18th, Regional Chief Ghislain Picard provided the chiefs with an update on the ongoing meetings with Quebec and described the challenges

working with the Quebec government. The theme for the Chiefs Assembly was Governance and Self-Determination so the chiefs focused the discussion on building capacity among each nation to support one another. The chiefs also discussed the proposed Quebec Indigenous Culture and Language Law. The common concern with the proposed law was Quebec actions around the Bill 96, which was an amendment to the Quebec Language Law. The chiefs felt that Quebec was nonresponsive to their concerns and were not certain that Quebec would listen to their concerns around a Quebec Indigenous Culture and Language Law. The Chiefs received a number of updates from the various organizations that support the AFNQL in education, economic development, and social service. Chief Edward and I were only able to participate in the morning session on the first day because of our meeting with Minister Lafrenière. On the second day of the assembly of the Chiefs received a presentation from the Chiefs of Mashteuiatsh, Essipit and Nutashkuan on a project titled Petapan Treaty Project. The chiefs described the project which is a land claim settlement over the three nations traditional territory, and if settled would be like a modern self-government agreement. The chiefs in assembly asked several questions regarding the claim and expressed concern with overlap and the impacts to their communities. Following the presentation, the Chiefs received updates from the various portfolio holders for the AFNQL and considered some support resolutions. The Chiefs also received a presentation on upcoming class action lawsuit on non-Indigenous day schools.

APRIL 21, 2023, SENATOR BERNADETTE CLEMENT



Following our participation at the AFNQL, Chief Edward and I travelled to Ottawa on April 21, 2023, to participate in a dialogue session with Senator Bernadette Clement on Indigenous Languages. Senator Clement invited a number of individuals from Akwesasne to participate in the session. The session was hosted at the Senate of Canada, where we were provided with a tour of the upper chamber. Following the tour, we were joined by Senator Brian Francis who is the Chair for the Senate Committee on Indigenous People. The invited participants engaged with the two senators on the importance of our Mohawk language but also shared their individual perspectives on Canada's Indigenous Language Act. Following our dialogue session with the Senators we accompanied Senator Clement to her East block

office for the unveiling of office plaque in three languages, English, French and Mohawk.

April 22, 2023, ANAF VETERAN'S PROVINCIAL CONVENTION

On the morning of April 22, 2023, I provided the opening and welcoming remarks at the 2023 ANAF Veteran's Provincial Convention at the Best Western. Senator Clement, Mayor Towndale and MPP Nolan Quinn also provided welcoming remarks to the Veterans and other ANAF delegates to convention, Cornwall, and area.

APRIL 24, 2023, COUNCIL MEETING UPDATE

- Council received a briefing from a recent finance committee meeting whereby the committee is recommending a Mohawk Council Resolution be rescinded for procedural errors and reconsidered after financial due diligence is completed.
- A request for a two-hour presentation at the next Council meeting was made. One hour at next weeks and one hour at the following will be allotted for the presenters.
- Council discussed the continued lines at Canada Border Service Agency (CBSA). A briefing was provided on CBSA's efforts to put more staff at the Cornwall Port of Entry. A follow up letter will be sent to CBSA President on the impact of border wait times at Cornwall. A request will be made to Transport Canada to look at facility / lane improvement to facilitate traffic and mitigate wait times.
- A request was made for garbage bins for spring garbage be made available in each district. Portfolio will follow up on viability and costs and report back.

- Council agreed to provide a letter of support to the Akwesasne Boys and Girls Club to accompany their funding submissions.
- A request to film within the community was discussed and will be followed up on by the Grand Chief.
- Council agreed that the U-13 Cornwall Girls Hockey Team will be honored at this week's General Meeting.
- A request for additional tree debris and clean up was discussed, options for consideration will be researched and reported back.
- Council agreed that request to a local wood carver will be made for the Jake Saiowisakeron Ice statue to assessed.
- MCR's passed: Approval of revised organization chart for ARRO; Approval of contract for Hamilton Island bridge design, Approval of (4) allot of lands – block one; Approval of contract renewal with Dr. Wysote, Approval of contract renewal with Dr. Scott; Approval of (2) contract renewal for mental health services; Approval to rescind MCR related to COVID-19 measure in long term care facilities; Approval of funding agreement for Glaude writer; Approval to rescind MCR for procedural errors.

APRIL 24, 2023, NEW YORK LAND CLAIM

On the afternoon of April 24, 2023, members of our internal MCA internal New York land claim met with our legal counsel to receive an update on the negotiations. Over the last several months our lawyer had been working with the other parties to arrive at a final settlement of the claim.

April 25, 2023, CHECK PRESENTATION

On the afternoon of April 25, 2023, I participated in a check presentation ceremony at Kanonhkwa'tsheri:io. Recently Council approved the allocation of resources from the Department of Community & Social Services (DCSS) to assist community program that support children and families. Checks were presented to the Akwesasne Boys & Girls Club for \$1,000,000, Generations Park \$100,000, Kana:takon Recreation Center \$100,000.

Tsi Snaihne Recreation Center \$100,000, Kawehno:ke Recreation Center \$100,000 and Iakwa'shatste Youth Fitness for \$131,000.

APRIL 25, 2023, JTBA - TREATY BORDER ALLIANCE RIGHT OF ENTRY

On the afternoon of April 25, 2023, I participated in a Jay Treaty Border Alliance Right of Entry working group meeting. At the meeting representatives from Immigration Refugee Citizenship Canada (IRCC) presented several scenarios to the participants on situation where American Border Natives are refused entry into Canada. The table discussed possible amendments and considerations for legislative amendment. The tables received a summary report to the governance table and discussed other agenda items for the table to review. The participants discussed at length the diverse options that would address the various scenarios.

APRIL 26, 2023, AKWESASNE MOHAWK POLICE COMMISSION

On the evening of April 26, 2023, members of our Council hosted a meeting with the Akwesasne Mohawk Police Commission. We discussed the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne prescription drug strategy and the need to continue to collaborate on the awareness of program available and the need to report suspicious activities.

Council agreed that they would identify leads to work on the research of previous documents on MCA's strategy and to follow up with the commission. A discussion was held on the community watch program, and it was agreed that a presentation would be provided on the progress of the program. Our council also discussed with the commission the Akwesasne residency law and the enforcement of the law and greater presents of police in the district of Tsi Snaihne.

APRIL 26, 2023, CANOBI AGTECH



On the morning of April 26, 2023 I traveled to Maxville Ontario to tour the Canobi AgTech farm. Robert Vincent the founder of Canobi welcomed me to the farm and provided me with background on his company and product. Robert explained to me that his vertical grown system has been designed to be operated by a software program that is preprogrammed to grow specific plants. We tour his facility where I was able to see the product and learn more about which vegetables are being tested on vertical grow tracks.

APRIL 27, 2023, BELL MOBILITY

On the afternoon of April 27, 2023, I hosted a call with a representative from Bell Mobility. The call was to touch base with the representatives ahead of our lease's renewals with Bell Mobility. The representatives committee to renewing the lease and the community

contribution agreement they have with the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne.

APRIL 27, 2023, GENERAL MEETING

On the evening of April 27, 2023, our Council hosted our monthly General Meeting at the Akwesasne Mohawk School (AMS) in the hybrid format using zoom. The agenda included a presentation on the Jay Treaty Border Alliance, Information on the Akwesasne Election Law amendments, update on Quebec Hydro, update on the MCA pandemic status downgrade, update on Fiber to the Home project and an update on the Rogers tower. APRIL 27, 2023, CANADA BORDER SERVICE AGENCY

On the morning of April 27, 2023, I hosted a call with the President of Canada Border Service Agency (CBSA) to discuss the increase in border wait times at the Cornwall Port of Entry. I explained to the President that the increase in wait times adds anxiety on not only Akwesasne but the border service officers. I let her know that staff shortages is one of the main reasons the wait times have increased and that I would be following up with a letter to her on our concern. The president acknowledged my concern and committed to responding to my letter and outline the actions being taken by CBSA to mitigate the wait times.

APRIL 28, 2023, CHIEF OF ONTARIO LEADERSHIP COUNCIL

On the morning of April 28, 2023, I participated in a Chiefs of Ontario Leadership Council meeting. The Ontario Regional Chief has called for

an in-camera call with the leadership council to provide us with an update from the recent Assembly of First Nations (AFN) Executive Committee meeting and to seek the approval from the Leadership Council to call for an emergency Chiefs Assembly to provide them with the same update.

APRIL 28, 2023, ST. LAWRENCE COLLEGE AUDITOR

On the morning of April 28, 2023, I participated in a call with the auditors for the St. Lawrence College. The purpose of the call was for the auditor to provide me with an overview of their audit and risk mitigations and provide me with an opportunity to provide any information on risks within the college. As the Chair for the college board, I am required to participate in the annual call. I shared with the auditor that I did not foresee any risks for the college.

APRIL 28, 2023, ONTARIO CANNABIS SECRETARIAT

On the afternoon of April 28, 2023, our internal Mohawk Council of Akwesasne Cannabis Committee hosted a call with representatives from the Ontario Cannabis Secretariat. The representatives had requested a call with us to provide us with an update on the ongoing review of Ontario Cannabis system and to provide us with an opportunity to provide our input and insight into the Ontario system. On the call of April 28, 2023, we reiterated to the Ontario representatives that Akwesasne has taken its own approach to regulating the industry in Akwesasne and we would not be examining an Ontario Akwesasne co-licensing system.
