AKWESASNE ELECTION APPEAL BOARD DECISIONS

The Akwesasne Election Appeal Board (AEAB) has reviewed appeals submitted against the 2024 Mohawk Council of Akwesasne General Election held on June 29, 2024. A total of 14 appeals were initially found to have merit and have been further heard and reviewed. The AEAB has made their decisions as follows:

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

In summary, the decisions above call for the results of the 2024 MCA General Election to be set aside in whole.

Any decision of the AEAB can be appealed to the Akwesasne Mohawk Court, by the appellant, within 5 (five) days of the decision.

EXPERIENCE DROULERS-TSIIONHIAKWATHA ARCHAEOLOGICAL SITE INTERPRETATION CENTER



Immerse yourself through history in a unique cultural experience at Droulers-Tsiionhiakwatha "where we gather berries" Archaeological Site Interpretation Center. Tsiionhiakwatha offers a unique window into the past of a 15th-century St. Lawrence Iroquoian village, reconstructed using traditional techniques to create four longhouses surrounded by a protective palisade. The term, "St. Lawrence Iroquoians" refers to a geographic area concentrated along the shores of the St. Lawrence River in present-day Québec, Ontario, New York State, and Vermont in which the inhabitants shared cultural traits, including a com-

Tsiionhiakwatha is not just a static museum; it is a dynamic educational hub where visitors can engage in the Iroquoian way of life through interactive experiences. The centre's commitment to authenticity extends to the use of traditional building techniques ensuring that every detail from the longhouses to the palisade is a faithful representation of history.

mon language.

Their immersive approach to education is particularly noteworthy. Engaging in activities from food sampling to overnight stays, visitors don't just learn about the Iroquoian culture—they can experience it. The opportunity to participate in archaeological excavations is a rare and valuable experience that con-





nects people directly with the past. It's a chance to uncover history with one's own hands, contributing to the ongoing story of the Iroquoian people.

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne and Akwesasne Rights and Research Office (ARRO) participate in Droulers-Tsiionhiakwatha Board of Directors Committee to ensure the perspectives and interests of the Akwesasne Mohawk people are represented and safeguarded.

Tsiionhiakwatha acknowledges and honours the living descendants of the culture it represents by offering free admission to all Mohawks. We encourage all Akwesasronon to visit the center!

COUNCIL WEEKLY MEETING REPORT

June 3, 2024

- Council discussed a letter from a community member who is offering to purchase land from the MCA. A response will be drafted and circulated for Council input.
- A concern regarding the QPIP insurance tax was discussed and will be followed up on and reported back to the community member.
- Council discussed a current situation regarding the Akwesasne Mohawk Police Service and their position on licensed community businesses. Council committee will report back after an internal meeting has taken place.
- A briefing was provided on a custody dispute that is affected by multiple jurisdictions and no court orders.
- Council discussed a complaint received from community business on the impacts of the current toll increased imposed by the Seaway International Bridge Corporation (SIBC). Council will follow up with

community business and SIBC.

- A concern regarding large item garbage pick-up was raised and will be followed up on.
- Council discussed a recent meeting with Hydro Québec and will raise the need for follow up on specific items with the liaison officer.
- A request for support for an upcoming golf tournament was discussed and referred to the donation policy process.
- Council discussed the need to advance an interconnection on the waterline and requested a resolution be brought forward to direct the process.
- Chief April Adams-Phillips agreed to chair next week's meeting in the absence of the Grand Chief.
- MCRs passed: Acceptance of (6) Compensation Policy for Executive Services, Dept. of Public Safety, AMBE, Dept. of Finance and Administration, Dept. of Infrastructure, Housing and Environment, and Dept. of Economic Development; Approval of changes to AMBE organizational chart; Approval of (3) housing upgrade loans; Approval of assignment of lease; Approval of (2) 2024 lease addendums; Approval of assignment of lease; Approval of increase to HAVFD annual allocation; Approval of (3) amendment to Akwesasne Canada funding agreement; Acceptance

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of Akwesasne Election Law Referendum results for implementation; Approval of reappointment of members to Akwesasne Review Commission; Approval of amendment to previous MCR for 3 Compensation Policies for Department of Health, Akwesasne Justice Department and Department of Community & Social Services.

June 17, 2024

- Council discussed the upcoming heatwave and requested an update from the Executive Director on the preparations.
- Information was shared on a proposal for a dog park. Follow up will be done with the requestor.
- Grand Chief Benedict briefed Council on his recent election as the Ontario Regional Chief and outlined the transition until the swearing in of the next MCA Grand Chief.
- MCRs passed: Acceptance of Transfer Payment Agreement for Native Inmate Liaison position; Approval of Assignment of (2) Leases: Colquhoun Island, Pilon Island; Approval of cancellation of lease on St. Francis Island due to non-payment; Approval of amendment to service contract with medical doctor; Approval of additional allocation to Akwesasne Freedom School building fund.

- Council discussed the recent

- changes to the traffic barriers at US Customs and requested a meeting be scheduled with representatives of US Customs to discuss the impacts.
- A briefing was provided on a draft MCA program/department's memorandum of understanding (MOU) with CBSA for delayed reporting. Council agreed to proceed with finalizing a MOU for medical transport.
- Council agreed to host a Council Meeting next Tuesday because of the Canada Day holiday.

MCA SHARES PLANS FOR SCHOOL A/C UPGRADES





The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne's Dept. of Infrastructure, Housing & Environment (DIHE) • Exploration of interim fixes along with the Ahkwesahsne Mohawk Board of Education (AMBE) would like to share information with the community on the process underway for the evaluation and upgrading of our three schools' air conditioning units.

Presently, each school is without complete air conditioning, and this is due to the present infrastructure and lack of electrical power and wiring needed. All three schools are currently using the maximum amount of power that the electrical system can safely allow. Providing cooled air to all Timelines are to be determined and updates will be classrooms of our three schools is a complex and costly endeavour; we are currently exploring all their consultants are committed to finding interim options to improve the environment for our teachers fixes in the meantime in order to keep the schools as and staff during the hotter months.

The following steps are underway, being led by DIHE:

PHASE 1:

- Consultants conducting a "load study" and exploring ways to obtain additional power




