

ORANGE SHIRT DAY IN AKWESASNE: A DAY OF STRENGTH AND RESILIENCE

der bright autumn skies to honor residential school survivors during Orange Shirt Day. Survivors, leaders, community members, youth, and local artists gathered at Generations Park in a spirit as well as baskets lovingly made by Shirley Thompson, Denise of unity and remembrance, creating a day filled with healing, cultural pride, and powerful moments of reflection.

Orange Shirt Day 2025 marked the first time the event was hosted together in partnership by the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne, the Saint Regis Mohawk Tribe, and Akwesasronon Sonatanoron, a local non-profit led by survivors and their families. The organization's proposal to Council inspired a community event to honor residential school survivors. Their guidance was central to planning the day in a way that honoured the strength, courage, and resilience of our survivors, while offering space for the community to come together in solidarity and healing.

The day began with a free orange shirt giveaway, featuring designs created entirely by local artists. Each shirt carried teachings, imagery, and stories that honoured our children, elders, and cultural survival.

From there, the community took part in a unity walk, beginning at Mill Street. With support from the Ahkwesahsne Mohawk Board of Education's Transportation Services, Seven Dancers Coalition and the Akwesasne Young Women's Singing Group, Route 37 was transformed into a sea of orange. Together, Akwesasró:non reflected, sang, burned tobacco, and carried their good minds into

The walk led into the Travis Solomon Lacrosse Box, where Akwesasne held its first official ceremony honoring residential school survivors. Survivor Billy Sunday opened the ceremony, followed by words from MCA Grand Chief Leonard Lazore, SRMT Sub-Chief Derrick King, Akwesasronon Sonatanoron Executive Director Rick Oakes, and members of lonkwahronkha'onhátie', a grassroots Kanien'kéha language group that expressed gratitude

Akwesasne's Youth Hoop Troupe and Ahkwesahsne Ratirennenhawi (Akwesasne Men's Singers) brought energy and spirit through dance and song. Attendees enjoyed a Three Sisters sit-down meal along with a variety of refreshments from local food and drink vendors, who provided delicious and nutritious options for the community. Meanwhile, interactive activities and teachings showcased the depth of knowledge, artistry, and spirit within our community. Niawenhkó:wa to everyone who shared their skills and teachings — from the artists, to organizations showcasing their programs, to those offering healing services at the SRMT Senior Center — for creating important spaces for connection, culture, learning, and wellness.

Chief Electoral Officer (CEO) Cheryl Jacobs completed the verification process of signatures and the results were delivered at the October 23, 2025 MCA General Meeting with the following results:

ber of the Mohawk Council is removed from Council if: (a) a petition requesting the removal of a District Chief is signed by an equal number of votes plus one from the official total number of votes he/ she received on election/by election day and delivered to the Council at a duly convened General Meeting.

According to the AEL Section 16. (3) Any petition submitted pursuant to section 16. (2) shall be examined by the C.E.O. to verify that each signature on the petition is that of an eligible voter.

According to the AEL Section 16.(5): Should the verification process in Section 16. (3) above establish that a minimum number of eligible voters for section 16. (2) have signed the petition, the results shall be delivered to a duly convened General Meeting of Council. Council shall declare the member removed and order a By-Election for that position.

Council held an Emergency Council Meeting on Oct. 24, 2025. Council passed a motion directing that the declaration noted in 16.(5) be made by the Grand Chief. Therefore, by way of this notice, on behalf of Council, Grand Chief Leonard Lazore declares to the community that Kawehno:ke District Chief Vanessa Adams and Kana:takon District Chief Teresa Oakes have been removed from office by petition.

A By-Election has been called for Dec. 13, 2025 for these two seats for the remainder of the 2024-2027 term, in combination with the By-Election already scheduled for one Kana:takon seat. This announcement is forthcoming.

MCA CALLS BY-ELECTION FOR KAWEHNO:KE & KANA:TAKON

On October 24, 2025, the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne accepted petition results removing two district chiefs from office and ordering a by-election to be held within 90 days. Chief Electoral Office (CEO) Cheryl Jacobs thereby announces that a By-Election for the Districts of Kana:takon and Kawehno:ke has been called pursuant to the Akwesasne Election Law.

The Kawehno:ke By-Election will be for one (1) district chief. The Kana:takon By-Election will be for two (2) district chiefs, as there has been a previously announced By-Election for one vacated seat.

The By-Election for both Kawehno:ke and Kana:takon will be held on Dec. 13, 2025 if necessary. Locations are yet to be determined. All three Any nominee wishing to accept their nomination must: seats are for the remainder of the 2024-2027 term.

Nominations for all three seats will be held at the Kana:takon School and Ahkwesahsne Mohawk School (AMS) fover on Saturday, November 8, 2025. Nominations will be open from 9 a.m. until 1:00 p.m.

NOMINATION PROCESS:

Eligible voters may nominate or second a candidate as many times as there are seats available. If you intend on nominating a candidate, please ensure you attend with your seconder and bring your status card.

Please check the Voter's List located at the following locations:

District of Kawehno:ke: Jock's Kwikstop & Bank of Montreal

It is your responsibility to ensure you are eligible to nominate.

Candidates wishing to accept their nomination will have until November 12, 2025, no later than 12:00 p.m. to accept and return their nomination forms. Forms are to be turned into the Chief Electoral Officer located at the Angus Mitchell Memorial Building in the village of Kana:takon.

(a) complete the Eligibility of candidates - Schedule "E", and

(b) do so by 12 noon of the third business day following nomination by submitting Schedule "E" to the CEO.

If the nomination process results in the need for the By-Election, the date of the Advanced Polls will be held on December 4 & 5, 2025.

Hydro-Quebec Battery Distribution - The Hydro-Québec battery initiative, led by the Department of Health (DOH) and Chiefs is still in progress. Eligible recipients are being determined by DOH for those that require power to ensure their safety and wellbeing. The distribution will involve Health and Elder Services, Home Care, Home Support, Department of Infrastructure, Housing and Environment (DIHE), EOC and Chiefs, and will take place in the

Canadian Border Service Agency (CBSA) — The CBSA Preclearance Working Task Group continues its efforts to relocate Canadian Customs to the U.S. side of the border. This remains

a work in progress, involving the Grand Legal & Governance — The Seaway officials. The P4 lane (designated for all working table. The P4 lane (designated for all Akwesasronon) was introduced to this working table.

The Port of Dundee Working Table includes CBSA Quebec regional partners, the Grand Chief, and Chiefs. Discussions are focused on improving the tax remission order, addressing lanof the port due to suspected increase in port traffic as a potential result of the Dundee Settlement. MCA is in the process of scheduling an in-person meeting to advance this work. The in-person meeting occurred on September 11, 2025. We restarted discussion on the tax remission order. Expressed an experience while travelling through the Dundee port, which raised concerns to questions that was asked, which were deemed as inappropriate.

On a local issue, I assisted with a case involving the seizure of a multi-use utility vehicle at customs. After speaking with CBSA on behalf of the community member, the vehicle was returned without penalties, and the matter was resolved.

Readiness Grant Funding proposal is still being worked on. This project, led by DIHE and Portfolio Chiefs, aims to secure funding in partnership with Indigenous Services Canada (ISC). The goal is to support housing infrastructure for lots that need to have roads, hydro, and surveying completed, and are ready for development. The proposal will be submitted to ISC once finalized. This initiative is ongoing.

Chief, Council, and high-ranking CBSA Settlement Claim is ongoing, with a strategy plan being developed by MCA Akwesasronon) was introduced to this Legal, Akwesasne Rights and Research Office (ARRO), Portfolio Chiefs, and the Grand Chief. Restarting the Seaway Land Claim is ongoing.

> Entewatathá:wi — Entewatathá:wi Self-Government Agreement (ESGA) is not a treaty but a self-government negotiation that will provide MCA with greater authority and control over self-governance, land, and resource management. There are still high priority items to be finalized, which are tax exemption of Section 87 and expropriation, which is in the beginning stages. It is being worked on by ESCA staff, Portfolio Chiefs, MCA Legal, and Entewatathá:wi Community Advisors who offer valuable insight.

Economic Development & Nationto-Nation Relations — The Iroquois Caucus (IC) Economic Development Housing & Infrastructure — The Lot Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) Agreement was signed by member communities to support nation-to-nation trade. The IC also signed an MOU with the Blackfoot Nation of Alberta to explore a potential harvesting agreement. This is ongoing and next steps are to be discussed at the Iroquois Caucus General Meeting, scheduled for October 20-22, 2025, in Akwesasne.

tionships and revive the One Dish, One Spoon principles. A new IC Coordinator is in the process of being hired, and updates will be shared as work progresses. It is great news to hear Wendake (Huron) getting into the One Dish, One Spoon discussion.

Harvesting & Conservation — The Iroquois Caucus Harvest Working Group (ICHWG) is addressing challenges faced by over 20 harvesters from MCA and Mohawk Council of Kahnawà:ke who are hunting without provincial permits. Discussions have taken place with the Ministry of Natural Resources to find a solution without court involvement.

A recent ICHWG meeting was held in Tyendinaga to review progress on harvesting issues. Representatives from Akwesasne, Six Nations, Kahnawà:ke, Oneida, and Tyendinaga were present. Plans are underway for a Cultural Sensitivity Workshop for some Federal Groups, and a Hunting Summit is scheduled for March 2026 in Montréal, hosted by Kahnawà:ke. If anyone is interested in attending the Hunting Summit in Montreal, please contact the Mohawk Government office.

MCA's Conservation Department also participated in a gathering in Kahnawà:ke with MCK. The meeting emphasized protecting our lands, resources, and waters and included shared contacts and funding information. MCK's conservation team has decreased from the original 10-person department. Joint efforts are being made to restructure their Conservation Department and MCA's Conservation Program is looking to create partnerships with MCK to be able to support one another. MCA's Conservation Program

> Transport Canada Lands (The Canal Lands in the North Shore) — Discussions with Canada Lands Group are taking place to advance this file in hopes of Akwesasne gaining these lands being released by Transport Canada. The process is ongoing.

> **Border Collaboration Initiative (BCI)** Port of Entry Cornwall — Matters that were addressed were Domestic Lane issues, secondary inspection issues, questions being asked and seizures occurring while travelling domestically. Additional discussions were lineups/ wait times and questions were raised on the possible implementation of callin hotlines for delayed reporting for Akwesasronon so they will not be impacted by the lineup. Further discussions are to be had, when finalized they will be communicated to the community. Process is ongoing.

Council was also informed of pedestrians and bikers failing to check-in to the Cornwall Port of Entry after leaving Kawehno:ke and the concern with CBSA. We are discussing possible solu- on Kawehno:ke. tions to mitigate this issue.

MCA was informed that the domestic lane usage has increased by 30%, which raises a concern with mixed corridor travellers and improper usage of the domestic lane. We are discussing a campaign to inform the community of the proper usage of the domestic lane.

DIHE Hydro Quebec Update Iohahi:io Cultural Center and Outdoor Pavillion — Ran into and issue

Political intervention was completed and issue was resolved.

> **DIHE Road Repairs and Replace**ments — Request for Proposals (RFP) have been completed for Harbor Road on Kawehno:ke and was awarded to Lazore's Construction on September 23 (construction underway). Sugarbush Road in Tsi Snaihne detailed phase is underway, possibly tender ready for Spring 2026. Three more additional roads are under review (Sweetgrass Lane and Johnson Road in Kana:takon, and Iohahi:io Road in Tsi Snaihne).





DID YOU KNOW THAT SELF-GOVERNMENT IS NOT THE SAME AS BECOMING A MUNICIPALITY?

Self-government is the opposite of becoming a municipality. Municipalities are created and controlled by provincial governments, with limited powers that can be taken away at any time. Instead, Akwesasne's selfgovernment agreement is based on our inherent right to govern ourselves, a right that existed long before Canada, and one that is now being formally recognized and protected through the Entewatathá:wi Self Government Agreement.

Self-government affirms our status as a distinct Indigenous community with our own laws, identity, and systems of governance. It does not mean giving up rights or becoming like a city or town. Instead, it strengthens our ability to make decisions for our members, based on our culture, values, and community priorities and ensures that this authority is respected and upheld by Canada.

THE BEGINNING OF THE ST. LAWRENCE SEAWAY AND **ITS IMPACTS ON AKWESASNE (1950–1959)**

In the early 1950s, residents of Kawehno:ke experienced the first stead environmental damage, economic hardship, and dislocation signs of the St. Lawrence Seaway. Canada announced plans for a massive deep-water shipping route, which would connect the Atlantic Ocean to the Great Lakes. While government leaders celebrated the promise of trade and power, families in Akwesasne braced for the disruption that would soon ensue.

For decades, Canada had pushed for the Seaway project along with the United States participation; however, the United States resisted due to cost and security concerns. In 1952, Canada announced that it would begin construction, a move widely seen as an attempt to pressure the United States into joining the project. Canada's strategy succeeded. For Akwesasne, this meant that large-scale development would proceed without meaningful con-

In 1954, the United States agreed to join the project, and fullscale construction began. Over the next five years, construction, dredging, and shipping channels reshaped the St. Lawrence River and the daily lives of those living in Akwesasne.



By the mid-1950s, families on Kawehno:ke saw their daily lives disrupted by construction of the St. Lawrence Seaway. The constant blasting, dredging, and heavy machinery shook homes and unsettled community members. Dredged clay and rock buried farmland, while changes to the river disrupted traditional fishing and travel routes.

As construction continued, the impact became more severe. Portions of the reserve were expropriated, forcing some families to give up land and relocate. Islands long used for settlement, fishing, and travel were cut off, while traditional fishing grounds were permanently altered as currents shifted and habitats disappeared. What governments described as progress brought in-

for Akwesasne.

By the time the Seaway officially opened on June 26, 1959, the community had already paid a steep price. Fields were flooded, islands were inaccessible, and fishing livelihoods had diminished. While governments and corporations celebrated the project as a triumph of engineering and international cooperation, for Akwesasne it marked years of displacement, the loss of farmland and livelihood, and a permanent transformation of the river that had sustained the people for generations

Did You Know?

Talks between Canada and the United States about a deepwater seaway began as early as 1921. Smaller ships could travel sections of the St. Lawrence, but ocean-going vessels could not pass beyond Montreal. The Seaway allowed deep-sea ships to reach the Great Lakes, opening new trade routes at the expense of Akwesasne lands and waters.

April 25, 1959: Seaway opens for commercial traffic

June 26, 1959: Official opening ceremonies attended by Queen Elizabeth II and President Dwight Eisenhower

While Canada and the United States framed the Seaway as a symbol of progress, for Akwesasne it brought displacement, environmental damage, lost access to islands, ruined farmland, and the steady disruption of daily life. Remembering this story ensures that the voices of those most affected are not forgotten.

With cooler weather upon us and flu season just around • Muscle aches or joint pain the corner, it's important to take precautions against re
• Gastrointestinal symptoms (diarrhea, vomiting) spiratory illnesses (like the flu, RSV, COVID-19, and the common cold) this fall and winter. Not sure what to do It is recommended that you stay home (self-isolate) if you start experiencing symptoms?

Here's the suggested actions to take if you are experiencing respiratory illness symptoms:

Take the Self-Assessment Screener: www.ontario.ca/ self-assessment

The Self-Assessment Screener will walk you through a series of questions and provide guidance on any severe symptoms or issues. Based on your answers, the screener will advise if you should be self-isolating.

If you have any respiratory illness symptoms (even if mild), such as:

- Fever (37.8° C or higher) and/or chills
- Cough, shortness of breath, or trouble breathing
- Decreased or loss of taste or smell
- Runny nose or nasal congestion
- Headache, extreme fatique, or tiredness
- Sore throat

while you are sick. This means:

- Staying home until you have no fever and your symptoms are improving for at least 24 hours (or 48 hours if you have gastrointestinal symptoms such as vomiting and/or diarrhea).
- After isolating, wear a well-fitted, high quality mask when out in public or at work for 10 days from when your symptoms started.
- Disinfect frequently touched surfaces, such as door handles and counters.
- Avoid non-essential visits to vulnerable individuals (e.g. seniors) and highest risk settings (e.g., hospitals, long-term care) for 10 days from when your symptoms started.
- Wash your hands frequently with soap and water or use hand sanitizer.

Unlike the Ministry's standard CPIN system, Ska'nikòn:ra was designed in partnership with RedMane, allowing ACFS creative control to tailor the platform with Kanien'kehá:ka values and softer, more clientfriendly language.

This new platform will streamline services across departments. For example, areas that once relied on handwritten documents will now have digital tools with built-in approval processes, improving efficiency even when staff are out of the office. Most importantly, Ska'nikòn:ra captures the voices and stories of families and children, creating personbased records that honor relationships and lived experiences.

The name Ska'nikòn:ra, meaning "One Mind," was chosen through a staff-wide vote after being suggested by Karen Jocko and reflects the collective effort behind this project. The logo,

designed by Courtney Skidders, represents the medicine wheel and the balance of working together in harmony to support families.





AMPS ENCOURAGES SAFE PRACTICES FOR ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLES

The Akwesasne Mohawk Police Service (AMPS) is reminding • All occupants MUST wear a helmet. Failure to do so will community members about the importance of safe and responsible All-Terrain Vehicle (ATV) use. While ATVs are a popular way to enjoy the outdoors, unsafe operation can pose serious risks for riders, passengers, and the community.

Over the past several weeks, AMPS has received an increase in complaints related to unsafe ATV operation, including excessive speed, noise, operating on private property, and riding in unsafe areas. These activities not only endanger riders but also compromise community safety and quality of life.

When actions put oneself or others at risk, enforcement measures will be taken.

ATV Safety Reminders for Akwesasne to remain compliant with the Community ATV By-law #1993-1994-01

- NO operation of an ATV between the hours of 11:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.
- Youth riders should be supervised and only operate ATVs suited to their age and size.
- The driver MUST drive half the posted speed limit. Failure to do so will result in a speeding fine.

- result in a fine of \$75.00 for "inadequate head protection".
- When operating on the roadway, the ATV MUST be registered and insured.
- Failing to stop for police may result in a criminal code
- A registration form for the ATV must be completed and can be obtained from the Akwesasne Justice Department Administration Office (45 Johnson Road, Kana:takon). License plates are also available at this location.

Restorative justice practices will be implemented, however repeat or dangerous violations, will result in fines or enforcement actions. Together, we can ensure ATV riding remains lawful, safe, and respectful in Akwesasne.
